

- Q. What was Harvey doing there?
- A. In the hospital?
- Q. No; with Johnson.
- A. You just want the actual time when he was actually struck, is that the idea?
- Q. Yes. Yes, give us that first then.
- A. Well, Johnson had an idea that he was going to die. In fact I think he wanted to die. He made that remark, that he wanted to die. And he wouldn't eat his food and I remember at least ten times when Sgt. Harvey and myself tried to make him eat his food, and sat there for as long as three-quarters of an hour trying to feed him. Sometimes he would eat maybe four or five spoonfuls and sometimes maybe wouldn't eat anything at all.
- Q. Now, how about this one occasion?
- A. Well, Johnson kept saying that he was going to die and that he didn't want to eat his food. And Sgt. Harvey grabbed hold of him and slapped him on each side of his face and I would say it would be as hard as you might slap your boy if he had done something wrong.
- Q. No harder than that?
- A. No harder.
- Q. Now, can you recall any time in the camp when Sgt. Harvey himself was beaten by the Japanese?
- A. Yes sir.
- Q. Would you tell us about that, please.
- A. I remember, I think it was on two occasions.
- Q. Well, let us have them both.
- A. On one occasion Sgt. Harvey had been over several times for about ten days, each day, to try and get them to make a cigarette issue and, of course, the Japanese were quite often--they would hold them up for as long as three weeks, even after they had the cigarette issue in. And Sgt. Harvey went over to the office and asked them again this day to get them in time for the work parties coming in. And when he came back from the camp office he said that he had been slapped, and he showed signs of being slapped.
- Q. He showed signs of being slapped?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Now, you said that you knew of two occasions. What was the other occasion on which Harvey was beaten?
- A. The other occasion was at the time--I can't just place the time but it was late in '44 or the spring of '45.
