Second Witness The Defence

Major-General Sir Miles GRAMAM, EDR, CB, MO, British Army, being duly sworn, is examined by the Counsel for the Defence :-

2,1217 I think you are Major-General Bir Miles Graham, KBE, CB, MC?

A.1217 Yes.

Q.1218 And you live at 10 Herbert Grescent?

Q.1219 How, I think General Gram you are asquainted generally with the nature of the charges in this oasa?

A.1219 Yes.

Q.1880 And I think that at the material time you were Major-General in charge of administration, 21 Army Group?

A.1220 I was.

Q.1221 And, of course, the 1st Canadian Army was part of

A. 1221 Part of the Army Group, yes.

4.1222 Now, in what capacity as Major-Ceneral in charge of administration did you meet the accused officer? A.1222 Yes. I met him very frequently. He was directly under me. He was really in the administration chain.

Q.1223 Yes, and I think he succeeded Brig. Walford as DA & QMG, let Genedian Army? A.1223 Yes.

Q. 1824 That would be about September, 1944? A.1224 Yes, early Autumn.

4.1225 Now, were you in daily touch with him, would you say, after that?

A.1225 Yes. I would say that I didn't see him daily but I was on the telephone or in close touch with him.

Q.1286 Right up to about when?
A.1206 Cortainly until after hostilities ceased, after which I still was closely in touch with him. I still, in fact, was closely in touch with him as before.

4.1227 Would you then generally give an estimation, in your opinion, of his character and performance?

A.1227 I would say that as for brig, Lister you could not possibly have got a better officer to conduct the administration in the Army and I think the whole Army one a debt of gratitude to the efficient may in which he undertook an extremely difficult task. The administration of the Canadian Army during the heavy fighting throughout that campaign was an all important factor in success and I could not have wished for a more better and more efficient officer or more dependable officer in every way that Brig. Lister.
