As a cloud, it protected and enveloped her in a world not ruled by the candid or inhabited by the tender. Her faults were the faults of youth; her spirit belonged to those who may meet men and women for a little while and inspire them for their whole lives.

"For the rest, you know my creed:

'Poor vaunt of life indeed
Were man but formed to feed
On joy, to solely seek and find and feast;
Such feasting ended, then
As sure an end to men.'

Suffering can never be suppressed by statute. It is a law of nature, but, as all other laws of nature, since it must be obeyed, lct us at least submit as sons of God and co-heirs with Christ—not as beasts of burden and as those who believe that all labour is in vain.
