It is easy enough to understand the effect of Judge Anglin's decision in the case of the Pere Marquette mailway officials, but it is not so easy to understand the reasons for the decision, points out the Hamilton Herald. In fact, the judgment is not one that will tend to heighten respect, in the lay mind, for judicial wisdom.

The judge decides that the Dominion authorities have no power to deport aliens under the alien contract labor law, for the reason that the Dominion Parliament had no power to pass the alien contract labor law; and the reason why Parliament had no such power is because the act involves the right of exercising extra-territorial jurisdiction, and the Dominion, not being a sovereign power but a dependency, possesses such right.

Extra-territorial jurisdiction is, of course, jurisdiction exercised outside of the territory of the Dominion. The judge holds that an alien canmot be deported from Canada without an exercise of this sort of juris-diction. Even if the exercise of it is not tangible and visible, it is implied. For example, a Dominion of ficial takes an alien to the national border for the purpose of deporting him, he shoves him across the line; but in so doing he exercises a force of propulsion, the effect of which is still felt after the alien crosses the line, and therefore the power of extra-territorial jurisdiction comes into play. Or, in the operation of sheving, throwing or in any way propelling the alien over the line, the still felt after the alien crosses the pelling the alien over the line, the official is in imminent risk of going over the line himself, wholly or partially, in which case he would be exercising extra-territorial jurisdic-

Somebody should forward this decision to W. S. Gilbert, It might revive the waning genius of the weteran librettist, and he would perhaps turn it into another of his de-lightful topsy-tury operatias. He mever had better material.

But about this matter of extra territorial jurisdiction. Suppose Canada were a sovereign power; how would she then have a better right to deport than the learned judge says she now has? Would sovereignty confer upon the Dominion any jurisdiction in United States territory Does any sovereign power now possess jurisdiction in United States territory other than the ex-tra-territorial jurisdiction within the bounds of the embassy at Washington f We don't think so.

If Judge Anglin's decision is good in law, the law as it stands is a humiliation to Canada. But the matter should not be allowed to rest where it is. There ought to be another test case arranged, and the case ought by consent to be brought before a full bench of judges, preferably the supreme court. And if the law is as Judge Anglin says it is, then Canada must obtain from the imperial parliament the right to send out of the country people who, for good legal cause, are not wanted in it.

AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

Germany Pacified and France Assur Paris, June 20.—An international conference for the consideration of affairs of Morocco is now practically assured as the result of the conversations between Pramier Variety tions between Premier Rouvier and Prince Radolin, the German Ambassa dor, and attention is now directed to defining the scope of the conference. Details are rapidly being arranged, and the officials expect to announce the plans for the conference in four

or five days.

This result, after the severe strain which tested the diplomatic resources of both Governments, has the effect of relieving the tension of the officials of the foreign office and the diplomats of the German Embassy agreeing that as amicable adjustment is near at hand. or five days.



Therefore, the conference is not likely to consider changes in the political status of Morocco, but rather internal reforms and commercial privileges.
