WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

(Office of The Grain Growers' Grain Company Limited, August 23, 1913)

Wheat.—An abnormally narrow range of prices, coupled with a small volume of business, made the wheat market an uninteresting affair this week.

There was little in conditions and circumstances surrounding wheat to attract outside attention. The principal sustaining power enjoyed by holders was the generally "Bullish" news from across the water. An item to attract general attention was a reduction of 110,000,000 in the Russian crop estimate by the officials in the Czar's country. Cable advices volunteer the opinion that the importing countries will be forced to continue as goodly purchasers of United States and Canadian wheat, owing to the rains in Russia, France, Argentine and Germany. Conditions across the line have not been as good as hoped for by growers as well as by "Bears" in the wheat market. Rains caused some sprouting in the shock and in many cases the grade has been lowered because of the frequent and heavy rains in the Dakotas and Minnesota.

In our own North-West some wheat has been cut, and of very good quality too, but there is still a great deal of grain that will require a week and some of it two weeks before it is ready for the harvester, with favorable weather. The cash demand is fair, but offerings are very small, with practically no feature in the market.

in the market. Oats—Oats have been little traded in, but the general tone of the market has been weaker, in sympathy with the Americans, the close registering loss of almost one cent on the three option months. Chicago reports most news as rather "Bearish" in character. Threshings are under way in nearly all sections and new oats have commenced to arrive in the Northwestern markets, showing a good condition on the whole. Cash demand was better, the East taking hold more freely. Lower grades up easily a cent-from last Saturday's close.

Barley—Barley remains unchanged from a week ago. Practically nothing doing with receipts exceedingly small.

Flax.—During the closing days of the week, this grain has been steady, after the decline it experienced at the outset, the close registering losses of 3½ cents respectively on the October and December options. No doubt this decline can be attributed to exporters reselling. Receipts continue small, although greater than a year ago.

Winnipeg Live Stock Stockyard Receipts

Receipts at the Winnipeg yards for last week amounted to 1,266 cattle, 91 calves, 3,587 hogs and 1,212 sheep and lambs, as compared with the previous week's showing of 899 cattle, 94 calves, 6,081 hogs and 1,038 sheep. For the corresponding week last year the figures were, 2,178 cattle, 1,331 hogs and 804 sheep.

Cattle

A fairly good number of cattle came to hand this week and the demand improved. Prices are fully 25 cents a hundred higher than last week on the bulk of the trading. Two or three loads of steers fetched 6 cents, which was the top price for the week. Most of the offerings were pretty common. The best butcher stuff went mostly at \$5.50, while the fair to good kind sold around \$5.00 and \$5.25. Cow stuff was in better demand, some loads of good cows and heifers bringing \$5.50. Best bulls are \$4.00, with extra good ones a shade higher. Stockers and feeders are steady at same values, \$5.00 to \$5.25 for the best, \$4.25 to \$4.75 for the light ones. Halffat stock is too plentiful and would do better if fielt in the country. The veal market is strong, best calves being \$8.00 to \$8.25. The cattle values will stay at present levels only in case receipts continue light, as a big supply would cut down values.

Hogs

Choice hogs still sell at \$9.25. Last week's

Choice hogs still sell at \$9.25. Last week's receipts were only moderate and the demand kept fair. Harvesting is expected to hold back receipts, so that present values may be maintained for some time. Thin hogs and rough sows are worth \$7.00 to \$7.25 and stags \$5.00.

Sheep and Lambs

A fairly good number of sheep and lambs, for this time of the year, showed up last week. Choice sheep are worth \$5.00 to \$5.50 and best lambs \$6.50 to \$7.00.

Country Produce

Note.—Quotations are f.o.b. Winnipeg, except those for cream, which are f.o.b. point of shipment.

Butter
Butter prices have not changed for the past two weeks, fancy dairy still being worth \$2 cents, No. 1 dairy 18 to 20 cents and good-regard lots 17 to 18 cents. More good weather, with plenty of rain, has helped the butter supply. Harvesting demands have not as yet made much difference in the shipments, but in a week or two more the receipts will fall off. Whether the supplies will be short enough to raise prices cannot as yet be predicted.

Eggs

The egg market is a trifle weaker, but candled eggs are still quoted 27 to 25 cents. For strictly new laid eggs there is a premium of three cents or more. The demand for the guaranteed kind is ahead of the supply, as most of the eggs shipped in to the city are a doubtful article until candled.

Potatoes

New potatoes have continued their downward course and are now rated at 50 cents a Washel. There has been no let-up in the shipments, with the result that a bigger supply is coming to hand than can be distributed and the outlook for any advance in price is not good until the rush of shipments eases off.

Milk and Cream

Milk and cream prices at last week's figures, 30 cents for sweet cream, and 25 cents for sour cream per pound butter fat. Sweet milk has been 21,60 per hundred pounds, but after September 1 this rate will be raised to \$2,00.

Dressed Meats

Dressed meats are down, more or less, beef suffering more than the others. Butchers are getting good quality dressed beef for 10 cents. Fork is 12 to 13 cents, fresh mutton 13 cents; fresh veal 14 cents, and fresh spring lamb 17 cents.

Hay

The hay market has improved during the week. The many carlots which had accumulated during the preceding two or three weeks have been cleaned up and the further shipments have slack-ened up, so that all that is coming forward lately is finding a ready sale. No. 1 Red Top advances from 89 00 to 810 00 a ton and No. 1 Upland is also up a dollar, now being quoted at 89 00. No. 1 Timothy is steady at \$14.00. Hay
