chance of any improvement while the rush is on on all the markets. Best veals are \$6 to \$6.50. Hogs are a little weaker. Comparatively heavy runs have been coming each day and the price is a quarter off last week's high point. On Saturday the bidding was \$9.25 for selects. Sheep and lambs have been slow selling this week. Packers are bidding \$7.75 to \$8 for the best lambs and the bulk of the best sheep are selling for \$6.50.

## Country Produce

**CALGARY PRODUCE**—Last week's produce market report from the Produce Department of The Grain Growers' Grain Company Limited, Stall 24, Calgary Public Market, reports that dairy butter is coming forward in fair supply and prices are unchanged. New laid eggs are coming in moderate supply and prices are firm. Potatoes are unchanged. Live poultry is in fair demand. Dressed hogs are scarce and price has advanced, choice light hogs being worth 12 1/2 cents per pound and heavier weights 9 to 10 cents.

**WINNIPEG PRODUCE**—Note—Prices quoted are f.o.b. Winnipeg, unless otherwise stated.

**Butter**—There is little change in the butter situation this week. Eastern prices have advanced one cent per pound, but so far no change is noted locally. Dealers are offering the same prices today, namely, fancy dairy butter, 22 to 24 cents per pound; No. 1 dairy, 21 to 22 cents per pound, and good round lots 19 to 21 cents per pound.

**Eggs**—There are less eggs coming to market and altho the quality is not improving, Western eggs being still the worst on the market, dealers are paying a cent more per dozen this week. Eggs are going to be dear this winter. Do not sell any pullets under any circumstances and feed and care for your flock so as to make sure of getting winter eggs. Dealers are offering 23 cents per dozen this week.

**Potatoes**—There is every likelihood of potatoes being a high price this winter. Alberta and Manitoba potatoes are not expected to be of high keeping quality. B.C. potatoes are much more desirable. So far shipments are coming reasonably plentifully, but dealers are offering 50 cents per bushel this week.

**Milk and Cream**—Cream prices are holding steady at 35 cents per pound of butterfat for sweet cream. Sour cream for butter-making is 30 cents per pound of butterfat. Milk is the same at \$2.50 per hundred pounds.

**Hay**—The outstanding feature of the hay market at the present time is the small spread between first class grades of Timothy and Clover and the Up-land and Midland classes of hay. There is only a difference of \$1 to \$1.50 between Timothy or Clover and Red Top. There is nothing in sight at present that would suggest any chance of an advance in hay prices, and dealers anticipate that little change will take place from present prices until about February and March, when prices on most grades will be lower. Today's prices for hay are: No. 2 Timothy, \$14 to \$15 per ton; No. 2 Red Top, \$12 to \$13; No. 2 Up-land, \$11 to \$12, and No. 2 Midland, \$10 to \$11.

It was announced in New York on September 30 that on that day, with the aid of a new wireless telephone, a man's voice was carried over the continent of North America and across the Pacific Ocean to Hawaii. The officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company said that the experiment had been conducted with the instrument between the naval wireless tower at Arlington, Va., and the naval station at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. This achievement followed a few hours after the company's engineers had talked from New York via Arlington to the naval station at Mare Island, Cal., and thereby aroused much enthusiasm among army and navy officers and scientists in New York and Washington.

General Alexander H. R. von Kluck, after a period of recuperation in the country, is now restored to health, and is living in his Berlin home. His health had not been good since he was wounded late in March by shrapnel fire while inspecting the advanced German positions on the western battle front. It is not known whether General von Kluck will return to active service.
