THE NEW CABINET.

The new Cabinet has been formed. It is composed of the following gentlemen: Sir John Macdonald—Premier and Minister of the Interior; Hon. S. L. Tilley—Minister of Finance; Hon. Charles Tupper—Minister of Public Works; Hon. James Macdonald—Minister of Justice; Hon. John O'Connor—President of the Council; Hon. Mackenzie Bowell—Minister of Customs; Hon. Hector L. Langevin—Postmaster General; Hon. E. F. Mason—Minister of Militia; Hon. Alexander Campbell—Receiver-General; Hon. J. C. Aikins—Secretary of State; Hon. J. H. Pope—Minister of Agriculture; Hon. F. B. Pope—Minister of Inland Revenue; Hon. J. C. Doherty—Minister of Marine and Fisheries; Hon. R. D. Wilton—President of the Senate, without portfolio.

The Mail, in alluding to the personnel of the new Government, says: "We congratulate the country on the formation of a Cabinet which will challenge public confidence alike by its ability, experience and representative character. Of the thirteen Ministers only three are without previous Ministerial experience and the three who have advanced to the highest level of a long Parliamentary training. The offices have been apportioned with a nice perception of capacity; and altogether the Government is in its collective character, the strongest which has been formed in Canada for many years." The name of Senator Wilton of New Brunswick was subsequently added. The mention which he will assume is that of President of the Senate and a member of the Government without portfolio.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

A Victoria despatch says the election for the Commons resulted in the return of Sir John Macdonald by a vote of nearly two to one over the other candidates. Mr. Price, M. P. P., for Chicoutimi, has resigned. Chicoutimi is a Conservative county, and unless it elects a member to support the Tory Government, as Mr. Price has done, the Quebec government will probably go down.

The Dunkin Act has been repealed in the County of Grey by an overwhelming majority. Some hundred votes only were polled against the repeal, temperance people being utterly indifferent as to the result owing to its general unpopularity and the difficulty experienced in enforcing the Act. In Bruce the Act remains a dead letter, the majority being in all probability quite as speedily repeal it than county also.

The Orange processions in Montreal have terminated, for the present, least by the jury refusing to sustain the charge of "unlawful assemblage." The indictments against individual Orangemen were also dropped. Seven of the Orangemen who were arrested have entered suit against Mayor Beaudry for damages. David Grant sues for \$10,000, and the other six for \$5,000 each. His mayorship will have a nice little bill to foot should the case go against him.

The appointment of the Marquis of Lorne to be Governor-General of the Dominion will be the means of bringing two members of the Royal Family to the shores of Canada. It has been arranged that the Duke of Edinburgh shall precede the new Governor to Halifax, where he will remain to take part in the reception of the Viceroy and his lady. Extensive preparations are being made for the royal party, and it is expected that the Marquis is expected to arrive at Halifax on the 23rd of November.

Fouries in Centre Huron are at fever heat. Something less than a dozen meetings is the daily average. The ex-Finance minister is "stumping" the riding along with the member for South Brant, Mr. Patterson. Mr. Platt is supported in his canvass by Joseph Wilson of Ingersoll, and J. J. Hastings, Esq. of Brantford. What the issue will be will not be a matter of speculation very long, as the nomination takes place to-morrow, 20th, and voting on Saturday. The Conservatives are becoming more and more confident that the constituency will be more ready and Hon. Mr. Cartwright sent to the right about.

An Electric Light Company has been formed in New York, with a capital of \$300,000. The object of the company is to produce light, heat and power by electricity. It is beyond the ken of ordinary mortals to force the extent to which this element may yet be utilized, but that confidence is placed in the developments now being made by Prof. Edison is evident from the readiness with which capitalists have contributed to this newly formed corporation. Great interest has been created by the announcement that a complete revolution is likely to take place in those very important constituents of this material world of ours—light, heat, and power.

A reconstruction of the Provincial Government of Manitoba has taken place. Davis and McKay retire and will not seek re-election. The following new Executive Council has been sworn in: Nonparty (Conservative), Premier and Treasurer; D. M. Walker, (Conservative), of the firm of Walker & Briggs, Attorney General; Hon. Joseph Alway, (Conservative), Minister of Public Works; C. P. Down, (a New Brunswick Liberal and supporter of Mr. Tupper), Provincial Secretary. It is announced that the Minister of Agriculture will be chosen from among the French natives. Thus the new Council will consist of five Ministers instead of four. An analysis of the personnel shows three-fifths to be of English representation and two-fifths of French. The English natives have the Premier and the English new comers two

It appears that two young men named Ryder, with their sister, were driving along the Elora Road, and when near the Baptist Church they came up with two men named Castledine and Corns, farmers of Guelph, who were under the influence of liquor at the time, and were conversing in a loud voice. One of the Ryders cried out to the other, "What do you say?" when Hornbostel stepped into the middle of the road and drew a revolver, and exclaimed, "D—n you, I'll show you what I am saying." The ball taking effect in the right cheek, near the temple of Miss Ryder, causing an ugly wound. She was at once conveyed to the nearest doctor's, and attended to. Hornbostel was arrested and taken to jail. Miss Ryder is still alive and hopes are entertained of her recovery.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Markham high school was destroyed by fire one day this week. A second crop of barley and a second crop of potatoes are reported on a farm near Belleville. The Irish Canadian urges the claims of Mr. James Taylor to a seat in the Ontario Legislature. The old Dominion of Canada note will probably be called in next week and new ones issued. Jas Gordon Bennett, of the New York Herald, gave his sister \$900,000 on her recent marriage. It is proposed that 100 papers take part in the May 1st commemorative meeting. The Provincial ploughing match for divisions 10, 11 and 12 will take place at Clinton on the 31st inst. An elderly man named Schaffer and his two sons were killed in a collision near Greenwood, Neb., on Saturday. Since the setting in of the frosty weather the outlook in the yellow fever districts is more favorable. The Federal Government has its assent to the Bill, and the early promulgation of the Bill as the law of the German Empire is expected. The country is now a veritable field of cloth of gold. The art of the milliner is in perfection, and gay banners are streaming from bush and tree. At the nomination held at Sandwich for the New Riding of the West, Mr. Wm. White, Conservative, and Mr. Geo. Rankin, Independent, were nominated. It is proposed to hold a grand banquet in Stratford, in commemoration of the magnificent victory achieved by the Conservative party throughout the Dominion. Guelph town council has instructed Mr. Howland, of the place, to take necessary steps to petition the Legislature for an Act raising the rate of the dig tax to a city. Mr. Wm. Huxley, of Fullerton, has sold his chaise to Mr. Ballantyne for 9 cents, which is a good price for one of that class, and a good price for the chaise. Mr. Huxley makes a good article, having taken first prize at the Cheese Fair at Ingersoll. FORESTRY.—Dr. Oronhyatchka, R.W.H. C. R. of Ontario, on Friday evening last instituted a new Court of Cyprus No. 20, with over sixty charter members, composed of the leading professional and business men of the city. His Majesty, Mr. J. Wright, owner of a saw mill about two miles from Henfy, while in the act of cutting a log, the canthook slipped and his leg caught between the logs. As he fell backwards, his leg got caught and he was killed. At last accounts he was lying on his back. Prices are booming in Buenos Ayres. The Buenos Ayres Herald, a sickly little six-column newspaper, reculates at \$1 per copy, or thirty dollars a month. Among its aids is one offering suits of clothes at \$70, with a choice line of new cravats at the astonishingly low price of \$100 each. The Elderslie council have passed a by-law granting aid to the Stratford and Huron Railway to the amount of \$25,000, which is to be voted on the 1st of November next. The Keppel council also passed a by-law at a late meeting to grant \$100,000 to the same railway. The Council of St. Mary's, who has been spending a few weeks on his farm in Muskoka, returned on Saturday last. He brought home, as a trophy of the chase, the carcass of a deer, which was shot by his son, a boy of eleven months. He reports game of all kinds very plentiful.
