**RECENT DEATHS.**  
**JAMES MANSON.**  
 The death occurred Sunday after a brief illness of James Manson, one of the oldest and most respected residents of the city. Mr. Manson had been ill for only a few days and his death came as a sudden shock to his many friends throughout the province.  
 The late James Manson was seventy-six years of age. He was born in Wick Cathness, Scotland, in 1832, and for a time was employed with the world-famous good house of Campbells in Glasgow. In the early fifties he emigrated to this province and soon built up a prosperous business in this city.  
 His business developed until shortly before the fire of '77 he had the largest millinery and dry goods business in the city, his Commercial Palace on King street being one of the most beautiful stores in Canada. In addition to this he owned several branch stores in the city and through the province.  
 Mr. Manson suffered most severely in the fire of '77, but with indomitable pluck and energy again started in business. He was again successful, and at the time of his death was still conducting a dry goods and millinery establishment on Charlotte St.
