Germans Wanted Iron and Coal

TE who would gain a deeper insight into the causes of the present war might trace its origins back to the curfous distribution which nature has made of the materials of present day civilization, and if you like, more directly, to the invention of Sidney Gilchrist Thomas, a young English chemist, who spent his nights studying at the Birkbeck School, in Lon-

It was the new process for dephosphorizing iron, in smelting, that gave sudden and unexpected value to the vast iron ore beds of Lorraine and the adjacent territory. The larger part of these lay in France, or outside of Germany. If Bismarck had only known their importance in 1870! There might never have been

then a European war.

For it was directly due to the fact that the great ore deposits of Europe lay in this territory, while the larger coal deposits were in the Ruhr district and roundabout, in Germany that the present conflict was precipi-tated. Germany's industrial greatness, her vast manufactures, the astonishing rise of her export trade within forty years, were all pivoted upon her huge possessions of coal, just as this is the key to the industrial greatness of the United States. It was almost wholly her possessions of coal and iron that made England

would have never had the wealth nor the factories with which to wage the mightiest war in history. Already her more foresighted economists are pointing out that unless one of the fruits of this war is the ore fields of France, it will be for Germany bar-ren of its greatest possibilities.

It naturally years the consumption of coal in the world has increased more than sevenfold, he takes note that while at the outbreak of the war England and Germany were producing about equal amounts of coal, their potential resources are quite unequal.

So far as present knowledge extends, the coal reserves of Germany are not less than twice those of Great Britain, and more than half those of all Europe. But he neglects to point out that this balance may soon be disturbed by the development of the coal resources of Russia. If the Russian fields should become Germany's possession or available to Germany her predominance would be still

more increased. When we turn to the comparative resources in iron, very much the same condition holds. The actual or known reserves of Germany are nearly three times those of Great Britain and surpass those of any other European country. France is her only notable rival. While the coal output and

resources of France are almost negligible, her iron ore holdings are enormous, practically equal to those of Germany. But they all lie close to the German border, and the first thing that Germany did was to seize this region and hold it The districts occupied by the German troops yielded France two-thirds of her coal and 90 per cent, of her iron.

Germany likewise seized the iron beds of Luxembourg and Belgium, of Poland and Western Russia. She has also practically monopolized the iron exports of Sweden, She thus possesses to-day, to all intents, a full two-thirds of Europe's iron, and potentially at least nearly as much of its coal. In natural resources Germany is to-day by far the most favored industrial nation of Europe. These are facts which must be squarely faced.

The Patient Parisian.

The real key to the French character is not merriment; it is patience. This has probably always been so, and if the French have at times shown themselves rebellious, it is probably because they have been subjected to great wrongs from their rulers.

During the war the Parisians have shown more than their customary wait and suffer. Having always heard the French describing always heard the French described, as a restive people, I was much impressed by their patience during the mobilization and by the calm of the Parisians when the first bombs were dropped. It was believed the city would be shelled within a few days. I then saw literally tens of thousands of them stand in line morning, noon and night outside the railroad stations waiting to buy tickets. It was not the fact that some of them wanted to get away. tickets. It was not the fact that some of them wanted to get away that surprised anybody, but the fact that such a mass of humanity could stand in line so long when there were thousands ahead and when for hours there would be no sign of advance. It must be that the French have had a special training from their bureaucratic form of government; they seem to be willing to wait forever for a man in uniform. When I saw those interminable lines filling the whole of Quai d'Orsay outside the Orleans station, I thought of the impatient crowds at Coney Island or at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge getting home from an ordinary day's work or amusement.—John N. Anderson, in Century.
