

Declares Canada Not Only Is the Country of the Future But Has Already Taken Her Destined Place-Unable to Find Greater Attachment to Britain In Any of the Colonies.

Lord Charles Beresford passed through Winnipeg recently on his way to New York. The admiral is in America in connection with the estate of his brother, Lord Delayal, who was killed recently in a wreck in Taxas. He went west to San Francisco from Texas and reached the city by way of Vancouver.

"One of the common remarks we hear in Great Britain with reference to Canada," he said, "is that the Dominion is the 'coming country.' There can be no doubt regarding the future of the Dominion, which will be increasingly bright for hundreds of years to come.

"The fact is, however, not that Canada is the country of the future—Canada already has arrived. She has



"If Canada should decide to break the connection between herself and the Empire, the tie of course would be broken at once.

"I believe, however, that there is not one of the colonies in which the people are more attached to the mother country than they are in Canada."

LIVED IN FIVE REIGNS.

Distinguished Canadian Lady Passes

Away In Toronto. By the death of Mrs. Featherston Osler who died recently in Toronto at the advanced age of 101, Canada has lost one of her most distinguished

lost one of her most distinguished daughters.

Mrs. Osler, who was the widow of the late Rev. Featherston Osler, rector of Dundas and Flambore, has lived under five British sovereigns, having been born in Cornwall, England, in 1806, when George IH. was still on the throne. She was married in England, and accompanied her young husband to Canada when sent young husband to Canada when sent out in 1838 by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. As the pioneer missionary of the Church of England, Rev. Mr. Osler endured many hardahips, all shared by his devoted wife. In 1832, Rev. Mr. Osler retired from active work and came to Toronto, where he resided until his death in 1895.

Since that time, Mrs. Osler seldem left her residence, but until a few years ago, she was an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of England, a body in which her deceased daughter, Mrs. Williamson, was a moving spirit in the early days of its existence.

There are now living five sons and a daughter, twenty-six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The celebration of Mrs. Osler's one hundredth birthday on December 14th last, aroused the very greatest interest not only among her large circle of relatives and friends, but in many cities where the names of her sons have become famous. All her living descendants with the exception of two or three were present on that occasion.

To few women fell the lot of seeing no less than four of her sons rise to eminence in differing but equally important walks of life, but this is the privilege which crowned hrs. Osher old age. Her second eldest son, the late Britton Bath Osler, K.C., was for years before his lamented death the chief ornament of the Bar of Canada. Edmund Boyd Osler, M.P., her fourth son is a leader in financial and political circles, and his brother, Mr. Justice Featherston Osler, has occupied an honored place on the bench for more than a quarter of a century. Her youngest son, Dr. Wm. Osler, regims professor of medicine at Oxford University, enjoys a world wide reputation in his chosen profession.
