THE NEW TICKET AGENT

W. H. Harper will be Succeeded by Out of Town Man.

A NEW INSURANCE FIRM

No definite information has yet been forthcoming from the head offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway as to who shall succeed the late Mr. W. H. Harper as city ticket agent and express agent for the company in Chatham. It has been learned from a reliable source, however, that the appointment will go to an out-of-town man who has been in the employ of the Railway for a number of years. The official announcement with regard to the appointment will probably be made public in the course of a few days.

Mr. Norman Harper, son of the deceased ticket agent, has severed his connection with the ticket office and the express office, and has gone into partnership with Mr. James Fleming, of Fleming & Tillson. These two gentlemen will handle the insurance business in this city which was formerly represented by the late Mr. Harper. They have opened their offices on King St. West.

The announcement is also made that the C. P. R. Co. intend making a number of extensive alterations and improvements to their present city ticket office and express office. The interior will be refitted with new equipment and furnishings, and the front may be torn down and rebuilt. The office, when completed, will be one of the most up-to-date.

A FIERCE ATTACK.

Zulus Beaten Off After a Fight of Several Hours.

Durban, Natal, May 31.—The rebel Zulus again attacked Col. Leuchars' column Tuesday.

They fiercely assaulted the British camp, fought obstinately for several hours, but finally were beaten off with heavy loss by the steady fire of the troops.

The British had three men killed and 12 wounded.

In an important circling operation of the command of Col. MacKenzie 40 to 50 of Chief Bambata's followers were killed and big herds of cattle and many women and children fell into the hands of the British.
