THE MAGIC DIAL.

A Puzzling Past That Seems Akin to Mind-Reading.

Ask any of your playmates to think of some hour of the day. Tell him to deduct it from 20 and remember the remainder. You produce your big clock dial and inform him that you are going to count around on the dial and that when you have counted the number corresponding with the remainder that he must remember, he must stop you.
Suppose he thought of 5 o'clock. Five taken from 20 leaves 15 remainder. You now count promiscuously (mentally, not orally), pointing at each count with a pencil to one of the hours on the dial (which must be provided in advance and is made by cutting out a circle of cardboard and marking on it with ink the twelve figures of the clock face).
Be sure when you make the eighth count to point to the "12" and thence in regular rotation backward toward the left. When you come to the figure "5" you will be stopped, as this will be the fifteenth count, corresponding to

the remainder, 15, which he was to remember. You will thus know that 5 o'clock was the hour thought of.
If this trick be repeated more than two or three times it is well to vary the number from which the deduction is to be made. Thus instead of deducting, as in the foregoing example, 5 from 20, the person addressed may be told to deduct the hour thought of from 18, but as 18 is only six hours more than 12 you must be sure to make your sixth (not the eighth) promiscuous count be at the figure "12" on the dial.
In the first example, with 20, the eighth count was made at "12" because 20 is eight more than 12. If 22 be the number adopted the tenth count must be made on figure "12," 22 being 10 more than 12, and so on with any other number.
When your friends see you are able to tell the time they thought of from different numbers to be deducted from, then they will be more mystified than ever and will become convinced you are a real mind reader if you don't let them into the secret.

THUNDERS OF OLD LONDON

The Most Famous Storm of the Last Century Was in 1846.

The most notable thunderstorms on record in London have generally occurred in the month of August. That which made the greatest impression on contemporary observers during the nineteenth century happened on the 1st of the month as long ago as the year 1846, and remarkable accounts of its ravages may be found in the journals of the day. A thunderstorm is not a good subject for a picture, but there appeared in one of the illustrated papers a view of "London during the storm—from Blackheath," which, whether a work of pure imagination or actually drawn from nature, was exceedingly realistic and impressive. The special feature of the storm was the hail with which it was accompanied, though the thermometer stood at 93 degrees in the shade. The panes of glass which were broken by the icy shower were to be counted by hundreds of millions, and so great was the damage inflicted upon the florists and nurserymen that a month or two afterwards a charity raffle was held at the Old Surrey zoological gardens for their relief. It is impossible, we are told, to imagine the aspect which the windows in London streets presented before the glaziers, whose services were for a long time at a premium, had repaired the destruction. It is a fact, indeed, anomalous though it appears, that historic hailstorms have usually coincided with periods of great heat, and, whatever may be the precise relations of heat and electricity, a heavy fall of hail is seldom noted except as the adjunct of a thunderstorm.—London Globe.

BAD SLEEPING HABITS.

Snoring, Grinding the Teeth and Nasal Whistling.

Man is the victim of bad habits in his sleep as well as in his waking hours. So distressing are some of these bad habits of sleep that they oblige wife and husband to occupy separate rooms, even at times causing divorce.

Snoring is of course the commonest if not the worst of sleep's bad habits. Snoring may be remedied. There are a dozen patented devices that, holding the mouth shut tight, prevent the snore.

Grinding the teeth is a disagreeable habit of sleep. It is impossible to sleep in the same room with any one who emits at irregular intervals this hideous sound. The trick is said to be incurable, but a rubber cap worn on the teeth renders the grinding almost noiseless.

Nervous persons sometimes leap in their sleep a foot or more in the air, shaking the bed and the whole room. The man who gives eight or nine of these leaps in the course of the night soon becomes an intolerable bedfellow. Nerve tonics and exercise should be prescribed for him.

Nasal whistling is a habit less easy to cure than snoring. The sleeper keeps his mouth closed, but breathes with a distressing sound through his nose. The sound resembles a low whistle and, heard in the small hours, is guaranteed to madden.

Great Men Who Drank.

Cato was a hard drinker, while, in the language of one writer, old Ben Jonson was constantly "pickled." The poet Savage used to go on the hardest kind of "tears," and Rogers observed, after seeing his own statue, "It is the first time I have seen him stand straight for many years." Byron says of Porson, the great classical scholar, "I can never recollect him except as drunk or brutal, and generally both." Keats was on a spree once that lasted six months. Horace, Plato, Aristophanes, Euripides, Alcæus, Socrates and Tasso of the old times and Goethe, Schiller, Addison, Pitt, Fox, Blackstone, Fielding, Sterne and Steele were all hard drinkers at intervals.—London Times.

He Was Realistic.

A newly enrolled volunteer was rather alarmed during his first experience of a sham fight, especially as he heard the colonel in command declare that everything was to be done "the same as in actual warfare." No sooner was the first blank cartridge fired than the frightened soldier dropped his gun and took to his heels.

"It's all right, sir. I'm doing the same as I would do in actual warfare."

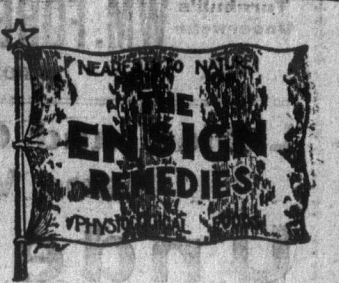
