Dr. A. W. Thornton leaves to-night for Florence, where he will address the circuit convention of Young People's Societies which is being held there.

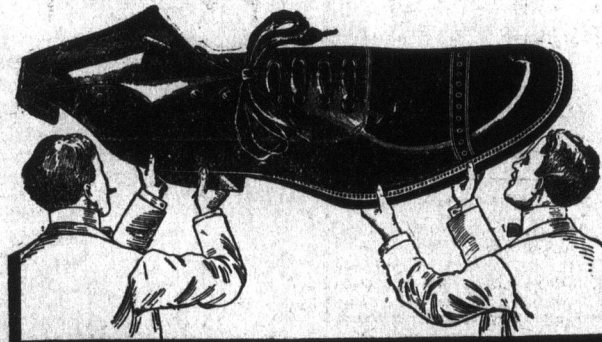
