Mr. J. E. Hales returned from Bellville, Ont., where he has been attending Business College, on Saturday last.

The Junior Class have engaged the steamer W. M. Wetherston for their geological excursion, and expect to embark on Tuesday next. The route will be much as usual.

Prof. Tufts is to deliver his lecture on "Our Great Northwest," in Acadia Villa Hall, Horton Landing, to-morrow evening. This lecture should be heard by every person in our land.

A deputation representing the Dominion Teacher's Association has asked Hon. Mr. Foster for a grant of \$2,000 towards meeting the expenses of the convention to be held at Montreal.

The Annapolis Valley Small Fruit Growers' Association meets at Kingston today, at 1 p. m. The usual reduction of fare by rail has been arranged for. The meeting will be of special interest to growers of small fruits.

Mr. J. W. Caldwell and Messrs Prat & Collins wish us to state that their stores will be closed on Tuesday next, Queen's Birthday. We presume the other stores will also close on that day, as usual, but have not been so notified.

Mr. Sandford has rented the dwelling next the College campus, from Mr. Sidney Borden, and will make his home in Wolfville. The property has undergone thorough repairs since purchased by Mr. Borden, and is now a desirable place.

The gaspipes are said to have been remarkably plentiful in the river this week and large numbers have been caught. On Sunday it is said the river was fairly alive with them. Some have been taken in violation of the law, and a few persons have been fined.

The Yarmouth Steamship Co. have issued a handsome guide book, which contains a number of full page pictures of interesting and historical points, including Grand Pre, Longfellow's home of "Ivanhoe," the majestic and famous Cape Blomidon, and sketches of charming scenery in the Annapolis and Cornwallis valleys and around the pretty town of Digby.

The Improvement (1) Committee of the Willow Bank Cemetery corporation have commenced operations on the grounds, with the view of improvement; and in order to keep out the general public whilst these improvements are going on, they have removed the gate from the south entrance and substituted a barbed wire fence eleven strands high, and nailed at the gate at the lower entrance. This effectively prevents the female portion of the town from gaining access to grounds, but does not in the least interfere with the male portion of the community. Com.

Some time ago we referred to electric street lights that had been put up by the Electric Light Co. and others. We are glad to note now that more have been put up by private enterprise. Messrs C. H. Borden and A. J. Woodman have had one placed in the east end, near their residences; and two have been placed on College street—one on the corner by the residence of Mr. J. W. Caldwell, and one near the College gates. These make a great improvement, and we hope soon to see all our streets lighted—either by individual effort or by the action of the town.

Mr Burgess' New Barquentine.

C. R. Burgess' new barquentine will be launched on Thursday, May 26th, at one o'clock. She is to be called the Golden Rod and she will be commanded by Capt. Wm. McBride. The Golden Rod will have a gross tonnage of 632.48 tons. The length of her deck is 158 feet; her midship depth is 132 feet; her midship breadth 32 feet. The gross tonnage is made up as follows:—

Table with 2 columns: Item, Tons. Under deck, 473.27; Cabin, 39.95; Forward break, 58.33; Forward house, 18.99; Lazaret, 15.00; Side break, 8.72; For castle deck, 16.62; Gross tonnage, 632.48.

The register tonnage of the Golden Rod will be about 580 tons.

Other dimensions are as follows: Length of keel, 150 feet; over all, 155 feet; Breadth of beam, 35 feet; Shearwater Cox was foreman in charge of the building. The Golden Rod will be launched full rigged.

I was glad to see your article in reference to the Minas Basin steamer. It would be better if we had more papers in Kings Co. to speak out in condemnation of the Local Government's action in this respect. This is a matter that affects mostly the counties of Kings, Hants and Cumberland, and these counties return a majority of opposition members and give a large majority against the Government. Now, perhaps Fielding, Longley & Co., think to punish us by withdrawing this subsidy. Coming a little nearer home, what has Mr. Webster said or done about this affair? The records of the house show that when this question was under discussion he was silent. As indeed he generally is. The action of Mr. Webster, on the other hand, merits the praise of the people of Kings Co. He spoke out boldly in favor of the subsidy being continued. The people of Kings' should be proud of Mr. Webster, as he is recognized as one of the ablest men in the Local Parliament. The people of Wolfville had little love for Mr. Weston last election. Mr. Webster receiving two votes to him one. I mistake the feeling of the electors of Wolfville if next election Mr. Webster does not receive four votes to Mr. Weston one. At least it does seem too bad for the people of this part of Nova Scotia to be used so, especially when Mr. Fielding can take a pleasure trip to Europe, as he did last summer, at a cost of \$1600 to the people of this Province. 
