District Institutes.

Inspector Roscoe read a paper on the foregoing subject at the Teachers' Association, in Truro, on the 16th inst.

The fact that not one-fourth of the teachers engaged in the schools have received any training to teach shows the necessity of some greater effort.

- 1. The time devoted to the Institute should be at least five days.
2. The work done should be primarily that of training teachers to do their work in the best way.

As an illustration of the method of conducting Institute work the writer said: "To put before you the idea, in my own mind, of what is to be done, I will suppose that some one, who has succeeded in teaching history, has been appointed to give a lesson each day, for five days, in the history of Canada."

The paper suggested that prizes should be given, at the Institute, to Nature Lessons, Music, Drawing, Calligraphy, and such new subjects as have recently been introduced into the Course of Study.

"If time and money spent in this kind of work shall be made to contribute in a marked degree to the advancement of the school, and to their value in fitting the young for the duties awaiting them, at the completion of their school days, we need not hesitate to go forward in this direction."
