Fresh Rhubarb in Winter.

A limited supply of winter rhubarb may be obtained even without the use of soil. All that is needed is to take up the roots now, as above described, with plenty of earth attached, and then leave in the open until frozen solid. Poultry Notes.

The dirty egg is a sign of ill-kept poultry yards and houses. Good feed and good care at this time makes the winter layers. It is hard matter to overfeed the pullets at this time for the extra nutrition is put into eggs.

There is no stock on the farm yielding better returns in proportion to the food consumed than hens.

Plenty of grit, ground shell, charcoal and good water should be at the disposal of the poultry at all times. When given with care, one of the best foods for young and growing chicks, and the laying hens, too, is sweet milk.

Eggs are high now, but will be much higher during the winter, it is predicted by many; so give the moulting hens and pullets the very best care, and have a share in the profit of winter eggs.

Keep the hens in the best possible condition, clean the houses often, feed carefully of good, clean feed, spray for mites and lice, and you will be apt as anybody to get eggs.

To Preserve Apples.

A simple and effective way to keep apples fresh indefinitely is to sulphurize them. Pare and quarter them and place in a clean market basket. Sprinkle it by a wire from a sack laid on top of a bottomless barrel. Slip a pan of coals over which 5 cents' worth of sulphur is sprinkled under the barrel and cover the top closely. Let stand all day; then remove the jars with as little handling as possible; press down lightly, tie up, and keep in dry, cool place. They are available for pies, sauce or mince when wanted. The sulphur kills all microbes, bleaches apples beautifully, and is harmless. A fine way to preserve summer apples when they are plentiful and the winter apples are known to be scarce in the orchards.
