However, with the capitalization of the club increased by \$15,000 an opportunity will be afforded some of the business men to secure shares at par.

Games will be played in the northwest, with a probable wind-up at San Francisco.

COBB GETS A HIT

Detroit, Sept. 1.—Detroit defeated Chicago today 9 to 8. The Tiger runs were the result of bunched hits and fielding errors by the visitors. Cobb, who had gone to bat 19 times without making a hit, came through in the eighth with a single that won the game.

Bob Ingersoll, a Seattle boy who could not win for Seattle but who helped Vancouver win a pennant, busted into the hall of fame a few days ago by pitching a no-hit game for Omaha against Topeka in the Western league. Bob went from Vancouver to Cincinnati, and from there to Minneapolis. He pitched pretty fair ball at Minneapolis, but could not win and then went to the Western league.

NO TROUBLE.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—No trouble developed today in connection with the opening of the bilingual schools. An arrangement has been reached whereby the new commission appointed by the Ontario government will have control pending a decision as to its legal status by the courts.

Shanghai, Sept. 1.—Six hundred Chinese were killed in recent convict munity at Kirin, Manchuria, it was learned here today.

THINKS WAR WILL END BY SPRING

"I have seen so many horrible, gruesome sights, that I am trying to forget them; please do not ask me for any details," said Mr. Sydney J. Prevost at the Dunsmuir Hotel, Vancouver yesterday morning, when asked for some of his experiences at the front. Mr. Prevost has only recently left France where he served as a volunteer with the French army. Mr. Prevost was rejected by the British, being over the military age, and volunteered without pay for the French army, being among the first of the British ambulance convoys to join the French. Being stationed at Albert, five miles behind the French trenches, he had every opportunity of judging the value of Frenchmen as soldiers.

"The spirit of the French soldier is simply magnificent. He has cultivated a supreme contempt for the German, stoutly maintaining that any Frenchman is worth two Germans. In fact, both the British and French have absolute disdain for the German infantry and if it was infantry alone that decided the war, the Germans would have been defeated long ago. Of course it is the guns that are the all-important feature, and even at that, when you consider that since Mons the French have held the Germans, and are supremely confident that they can hold unaided until the end of the war, you will see that the French have lived up to the expectations of the best admirers against the boasted Germans.

Mr. Prevost stated that the French organization has been vastly improved since the beginning of the war. The men are now well-boostered and clothed, capably officered, and with hospitals well organized and doing splendid work, which last named feature is a vast improvement over the start of the war, when the whole French ambulance and hospital service fell down woefully.

"The German officers show their national hatred of the English at every opportunity," he said. "During my stay in France, where I had the run of the hospitals at Albert in connection with my work, I came across wounded German officers some of them quite seriously wounded. Of course when a fellow is down and out you forget animosities, and I used at first to offer some of the officers a cigarette, only to have them insolently refuse it or pretend they never saw me. They would accept any favors, however, from the French or any of the other allies. On the other hand, the French are becoming imbued with a natural and deep hatred of things German, and in my opinion that is going to be one of the problems after the war—the intense natural hatred of the Germans for the British and the French for the Germans.

"If I might predict I should say the war will be over by spring. The Germans are only fleet and blood and they cannot withstand the Allies much longer. Grant them all the advantages of guns and organization—and these are but temporary—they are only human after all and will not long withstand the ever increasing pressure being brought to bear by the allies."

Mr. Prevost returns to England within the next ten days, his trip to Vancouver being necessitated by business interests.

RUBE MARQUARD IS WITH THE DODGERS.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Sept. 1.—Fans who follow the fortunes of the Brooklyn Dodgers were handed a double prize package of surprise in the second game of the double-header with Pittsburg today when Manager Robinson trotted out Larry Cheney on the mound to open the game, and then introduced Rube Marquard in a Dodger uniform to finish out the last two innings. Cheney was bought from Chicago yesterday.

Marquard refused absolutely to play any league of lower classification than the majors and informed the New York management that he would not go to Toronto. It is understood he agreed to a cancellation of his iron-clad contract with the Giants which calls for an immoderately large salary, and went to Brooklyn under a new salary agreement.

Both Marquard and Cheney are signed to two-year contracts, says President Ebbetts.

SPANISH NEWSPAPERS ARE DEMANDING ACTION.

Madrid, Sept. 1.—The crew of the Spanish steamship Esadars, torpedoed by a German submarine, arrived today at Bilbao. Energetic measures against Germany are demanded by the press.

AMERICAN BARQUE FIRED UPON

Boston, Sept. 1.—The American barque Ruth Stark, owned in this city, was fired upon twice by a German submarine on Aug. 3 when 150 miles off Cape Clear, Ireland, according to the report of her commander upon his arrival here today from Liverpool.

CAPTAIN AND CREW ARRIVE

New York, Sept. 1.—Captain Wyre and seven members of the crew of the schooner Stofal, torpedoed off the Irish coast by a German submarine Aug. 19 arrived here today on the British steamship Rossano.

CHOLERA IN HOBOKEN, N.J.

Hoboken, N. J., Sept. 1.—The interned Hamburg-American liner President Lincoln was in quarantine here today while immigration doctors were investigating reported cases of cholera. About 200 Germans are aboard the vessel.

HARRY THAW SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 1.—Harry Thaw, through his attorney, former Governor Stone, today filed suit for divorce from Evelyn Thaw. John France is named in the complaint as co-respondent.

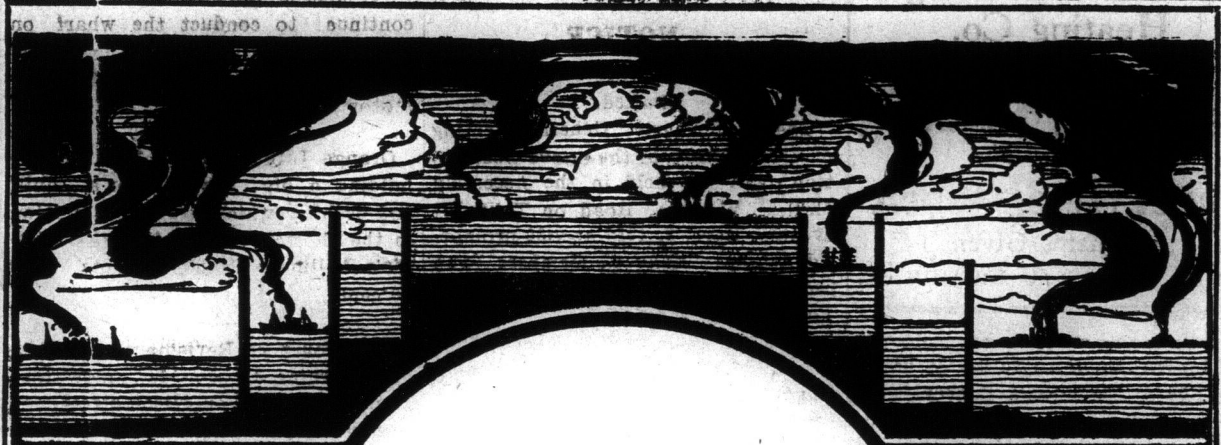
