We noticed in Resignations. ourlast, the resignations of the hon. Mr. Uniacke, Mr. Howe, and Mr. M'nab, as Members of the Executive Council. The Ga zette of Tuesday contained the notes of these gentlemen to his Excellency I ord Falkland, tender ing the same, accompanied by a lengthy reply from his Excellency. This is an important document, masmuch as it explains most fully the principles upon which his Lordship intends admi nistering the Government of the Province - the admission into his Councils of leading men from each party, in order "that the country should have the assurance of a fair and equal distribution of pa tronage in the exercise of the pero gative of the crown ;" a course which we feel convinced will meet with the approval of a large majority of the people of Nova Scotia.

His Excellency's Tetter has called forth repties from Mr. Uniacke and Mr. Howe. The only reason assigned by these gentlemen for their resignations is the appointment of Mr. Almon.

There has been a Ministerlal crisis in Spain. After the ceremo ny which gave a Parliamentary confirmation to the Queen's majority, S. Lopez and his Cabinet somewhat estentatiously tendered that their appointment had bither propensities. I sa much expedition as may be found on me fole with

to been only provisional. They were requested by the Queen to retain their places; but it was un darstood that S. Lopez would ulti mately retire.

At this point another resignatiexcited a good deal of speculation On the 14th inst. Gen. Narvaz resigned his office as Captain-Gen. of New Castile. The cause is said to be offeuce at some ceusure which he had incurred by a strange breach of decerum, in taking to the Palace a number of drunken officers whom he had treated, and insisting that they should kiss the Queen's hand.

The resignation, probably, was the finishing stroke to the fale of the Lopez Ministry, already dismayed at the difficulties which it would have to encounter in the Cortes; and, on the evening of the 15th, the Queen commissioned S. Olozago to form a Cabinet. It was suppose! that General Serra no would continue in office.

### FRANCE.

It is said, that the Government are uneasy at the Duke of Bourdeaux's visit to England; and some color is given to the report by the statement which appeared in The Times, that Prince Polig. nac, who had come with four children to spend the winter at Paris, had been ordered by the Police, on Monday, to quit it in forty eight hours. : Marshal Sebastiana, who is connected with the Prince by marriage, is said to have gone to St. Cloud to procure the King's authority for withdrawing the order, but the only concession he obtained was an extension of the period during which the Prince could be allowed to remain. The alarm of the Parisians at the fortifications, by which their enthralment is becoming more complete, increases daily, as some 'new and commanding tower or "bastile" is unmasked.

The King has received a letter from the President of the United States, congratulating him on the Prince of Joinville's marriage.

There has been illness among the little Princes: the Count of the Paris has just recovered from a store cold; and the Count of Eu has been suffering from croup, tut was doing well.
