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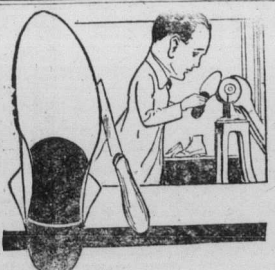

Summary of Night Dispatches

Ottawa, April 20.—The male members of the executive of the Great War Veterans' Association, Dominion Command, have all joined the "Overland Brigade" and will appear in them today.

Home for Old Teachers.
Montreal, April 20.—The celebration of the tercentenary of Venerable Marguerite Bourgeoise ended here yesterday. A cheque for \$10,000 was received toward the erection of a home for old sisters, who have spent their lives in teaching.

British Policy on Palestine.
London, April 20.—Rumors that the British government had changed its policy regarding Palestine were denied officially in the House last night.

The League of Flame.
Flournoy, April 20.—D'Amazio is forming an anti-league of nations, consisting of minority elements in all countries of "oppressed peoples," to be called "League of Flame."

Bolshevik Campaign a Failure.
Warsaw, April 20.—According to military observers the Bolshevik offensive on the Polish frontier thus far has been a total failure.

Leader of Outlaws Jailed.
Chicago, April 20.—John Grunau, president of the "outlaw" Chicago Yardmen's Association, was taken to the county jail at Joliet yesterday, after refusal to find \$10,000 bond on charge of violating the Lever Act. Two other leaders were arrested yesterday.

To Reply to Wilson.
San Remo, April 20.—Considering Turkey's peace treaty, the Supreme Allied Council decided to reply to President Wilson's note on the subject, explaining why it could not accept the points he made in this connection.

Mexican Revolt Spreads.
Agua Prieta, April 20.—Large forces in Chihuahua have revolted against the Carranza government and have aligned themselves with the Sonora revolution.

Irish Political Prisoners.
Dublin, April 20.—Important government regulations were issued last night fully providing for the treatment of prisoners, so as to avoid the consequences of friction which has hitherto prevailed. Prisoners for political offences are to receive ameliorative treatment.

Soldier Relief in U. S.
Washington, April 20.—House Republican leaders yesterday tentatively agreed to raise funds for soldier relief by a gross sale tax of not more than one per cent.

The Moslem and the Jew.
London, April 20.—The British government has appointed a commission to inquire into the recent clashes between Moslems and Jews.

A Fatal Hurricane.
Little Rock, Ark., April 20.—In a storm that swept northeast Arkansas Sunday night, twenty persons were killed and many injured.

Ambassador to U. S. Arrives.
New York, April 20.—Sir Auckland Geddes, new British Ambassador to the United States, arrived here yesterday.

No Irish Gun Running.
London, April 20.—Andrew Bonar Law, in the Commons last night, said nothing was known of any gun running into Ireland.
