QUEBEC, Sept. 4.—The sensation of the sitting of the Coroner's Inquest in connection with the bridge disaster was the testimony of Alexandre Oulmet, one of the bridge workmen. Oulmet, who was a painter, had gone to the land for a drink of water, and was returning when he saw the bridge begin to settle. He saw his heels caught and crushed.
