CANADIAN FORESTRY HELD CONVENTION

Recommend Other Provinces to Follow Lead of Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia in Requiring Crown Land Lumber to be Manufactured at Home.

Quebec, Jan. 20.—At the Dominion Forestry Convention, it was resolved, that this association approves of the action of the governments of Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia in requiring that lumber cut on Crown Lands should be manufactured in Canada, and it would be pleased to see the other provinces follow their example. TEMPERANCE JUBILEE

Newcastle Division Celebrates the Sixtieth Anniversary of their Foundation.

A well-attended Temperance Mass Meeting was held in Temperance Hall Wednesday night, 15th inst., to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of Newcastle Division, No. 45, S. of T., which has through all that time been in active work. James Falconer, a Veteran of the Order for fifty years, occupied the chair, and on the platform were the G. W. P., the District Scribe and three local clergymen. The musical and literary program was exceptionally fine, and immensely enjoyed by the audience.

JAMES FALCNER. Mr. Falconer welcomed the audience and showed how Temperance had made great progress during the Divisions sixty years of uninterrupted active existence.

S. S. HENNIGAR. G. W. P. Hennigar congratulated the Division and urged its claims upon his hearers' support. He showed that intemperance was the cause of much poverty and woe.

REV. DR. COUSINS. Dr. Cousins said, that while Newcastle might not congratulate itself upon our temperance standing we could congratulate ourselves upon progress elsewhere in Canada, mainly in Ontario. Ontario local option was much better than Scott Act. The liquor evil was still with us. An election was near. Last year just before election certain candidates made very fair promises but the present Council was worse than the preceding one. There were lots of good men in town from whom a Council might be elected. We should prepare for civic election. Total abstainers or at least those who would work an impartial course

the law were wanted—Councillors who were not afraid to act. During the year the drink evil had not abated.

REV. S. J. MACARTHUR. Rev. Mr. MacArthur said that the S. of T. had done good work. He did not know what the recent Scott Act raids might mean. It might be a periodical spasm of reform which the town is said to take every once in a while. It might be an effort to make electors think that certain people are very much interested in the town's welfare. The town had got and could get just what the majority wanted. He was afraid that the majority of our citizens had lost all hope of better conditions. He trusted that a change was imminent.

REV. W. J. DEAN. Rev. Mr. Dean spoke hopefully of Temperance progress. The Scott Act was good, so was local option, but we wanted total, national prohibition.

H. H. STUART. H. H. Stuart said that when the temperance people of Canada had demanded suppression of the liquor evil the financial interests of the traffic were strong enough to prevent the Scott Act being honestly designed to put an end to drinking. The Scott Act was defective. It should not allow prescriptions for liquor to be obtainable from medical men outside the municipality; it should not allow individuals to import all they desired from outside. No one should keep liquor for sale, but the vendors appointed by the Government, and the Vendor who sold whatever liquor was considered necessary should be merely a civic servant employed and paid by the government. The liquor business should be taken entirely out of private hands, thus destroying the baneful element of private profit. Until these charges could be effected, however, the Scott Act, which had done much good and was capable of doing much more, if properly worked, should be honestly enforced. The overthrow of alcoholism was absolutely essential to the nation's physical, mental and moral health. Much praise is due the enthusiastic and efficient committee—Miss Margaret Dunnett, Messrs. James Falconer, W. C. Day and others—who labored to make the meeting such a success.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL

Met Here Last Week.—Vote Against any Change in System of Taxation—Assessments Ordered and Bills Passed.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Council resumed at 2 o'clock. \$65 awarded to W. A. Campbell in payment of land taken for a road in Ludlow was ordered paid. The sec-treas. was authorized to borrow not more than \$8000 for county purposes. Hardwicke was assessed \$733 for roads and \$65 for pauper lunatics. Adjourned till 10 a. m. Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON

A petition from Glenelg rate-payers, asking for a new polling place at or near Wilson's Bridge, Lower Napan, was referred to Petitions Committee. Following assessments were passed:

Blissfield—Roads, \$600; pauper lunatics, \$65. Southesk—Roads, \$600. Chatham—Roads, \$1400; pauper lunatics, \$374.53. Nelson—Roads, \$1360; pauper lunatics, \$163. Ludlow—Roads, \$500.

Coun. Lewis—This year is one that will be celebrated in the history of the British Empire as the coronation year. We are sitting here in this Council as the representatives of the greatest county in the Maritime Provinces (hear, hear), while one of the founders of this Dominion sleeps in a nearby churchyard in an unmarked grave. I move that a committee of five be appointed to see what steps can be taken by this Council to have the grave of Hon. Peter Mitchell properly marked.

The resolution was adopted and the following committee appointed—Lewis, Anderson, Flett, Connors, Clarke.

Coun. Flett reported on almshouse accounts. They had been found correct, and the books are kept in a neat manner by Mr. Call. Bills appeared for large quantities of provisions and groceries at retail prices, and the Committee thought the commissioners should ask for tenders for the estimated quantity of supplies needed during the year. The county should buy at wholesale and not at retail. He moved that almshouse assessments be levied as follows:

Report adopted and assessments ordered.

On motion it was ordered that H. H. Mott, architect, be heard Thursday afternoon in reference to plans for new courthouse. Alnwick was assessed \$1700 for roads and \$130 for pauper lunatics.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

North Esk was assessed \$650 for roads. Coun. Pond's motion to amend bye-law relating to cattle at large in Ludlow, referred to bye-law committee.

Blackville was assessed \$1400 for roads. Coun. Lewis for committee reported favorably on petition for new polling place in Glenelg.

The committee on the memorial from the Union of N. B. Municipalities reported as follows: "Your committee, having carefully considered the resolution of the Union of Municipalities respecting the adoption of a new system of taxation, have ascertained, after an exhaustive inquiry that no tax or taxation system, from the birth of civilization, is

Williston with contingent fund, \$2685.65 owed by the county; prisoners' board, \$403.30; school account, \$8995.72 on hand; jury fees, \$407.60; Dr. Losier, 3 certificates of lunacy \$12; Dr. Duffy, 2 certificates of lunacy, \$8; W. P. Troy, prisoners' board, \$8.67; Dr. Hayes, cert. of lunacy, \$4; Sec. Treasurer, postage, stationery, etc., \$80; D. & J. Ritchie wood for jail, \$35.50; D. Morrison, coats for jail, \$13.60; Auditor, \$60; Dr. Wier, certificate of lunacy and mileage \$5; Union of Municipalities, \$10 to be for 1911 dues; Dr. Duffy, attending McGinnis, a lunatic, \$15; M. S. N. Co., fares for prisoners, \$11.65.

Adjourned till Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

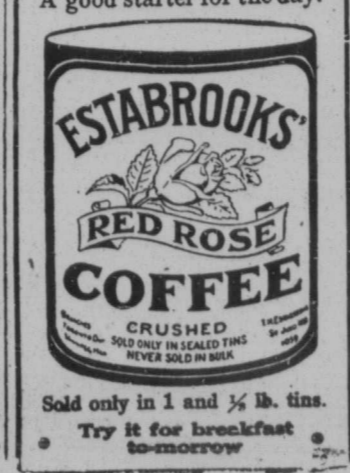

TO ERECT MONUMENT TO HON. PETER MITCHELL

Public Meeting at Newcastle Chooses Committee of Prominent Men to Collect Subscriptions for Monument Costing \$5300 to be Erected Here.

A public meeting in the Town Hall Thursday night, called by the county council to consider the placing of a suitable monument over the grave of the late Hon. Peter Mitchell, was attended by most of the councillors, all the aldermen in town and many citizens.

Ald. John Clark was chosen chairman and T. W. Butler, K. C., secretary.

Coun. Lewis, chairman of the council's committee, stated the objects of the meeting.

On motion Ald. Morrison and Coun. Anderson, the meeting proceeded to organize a memorial committee to solicit funds for the erection of a monument to the Hon. Peter Mitchell.
