Jump In Rates For Insurance On Farm Property

Because the losses by fire on farm buildings show a percentage considerably heavier than losses on other forms of property, the New Brunswick board of fire underwriters will increase farm rates twenty-five per cent per annum. The rate for persons owning and occupying farm property will be lower than in cases where the farms are occupied by tenants. Insurance men consider that men owning and occupying farms take greater care and exercise stricted precautions against fires than do the tenants who have little to lose outside of their furniture and contents of barns and sheds. There is, of course, a lighter premium where farms are located in fire districts of town and cities—Telegraph.
