

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The fifth session of the seventh Parliament opened at Ottawa, on Thursday last, with the usual ceremonies.

The speech from the throne was as follows: Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: It is with much satisfaction that I again have recourse to your advice and assistance in the administration of the affairs of the Dominion.

By the sudden and lamented death of the late Right Hon. Sir John Thompson, Canada has sustained a grievous loss. The deep and heartfelt sympathy expressed by Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, and the manifestations of sorrow with which the distressing intelligence was received throughout the empire, as well as tokens of esteem and respect everywhere paid to the memory of the deceased statesman, have been generally appreciated by the people of Canada.

Satisfactory assurances having been received from Her Majesty's government respecting the interpretation of certain clauses in the treaty of commerce with France, ratifications will be exchanged as soon as the necessary legislation has been passed.

The recent action of the imperial parliament enabling the various Australian governments to enter into preferential trade relations with the other self-governing colonies of the empire affords gratifying proof that the suggestions of the colonial conference are being favorably entertained by Her Majesty's government.

In conformity with a recent judgment of the lords of the judicial committee of the privy council to the effect that the dissenting minority of the people of Manitoba have a constitutional right of appeal to the governor-general-in-council against certain acts passed by the legislature of the province of Manitoba in relation to the subject of education, I have heard in council the appeal, and my decision thereon has been communicated to the legislature of the said province.

The depression in trade which has prevailed throughout the world for the past few years has made itself felt in Canada but fortunately to a less degree than in most other countries. Although this has not resulted in any considerable decrease in the volume of our foreign trade, yet owing to low prices and recent reductions in and removal of taxation, it has been followed by a serious decrease in revenue derived from customs and excise.

In order to procure equilibrium between revenue and expenditure for the coming year, it will be necessary to observe the greatest possible economy in the appropriations for the various branches of the public service. During the period that has elapsed since the last session of parliament I have had an opportunity of visiting many portions of the Dominion, including the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories and British Columbia. Through-out these tours I have been impressed and gratified by manifestations of

an abounding loyalty and public spirit; and notwithstanding the phase of trade depression already referred to I observed everywhere unmistakable signs of that confident hopefulness in the future, based on a thorough belief in the greatness of the resources of Canada, which is one of the characteristics of her people and which furnishes a good augury and pledge of further development and progress.

The government of Newfoundland having intimated its desire to renew negotiations looking to admission of that colony into the Dominion of Canada, a sub-committee of my advisers have recently met in conference a delegation from the island government and discussed with them the terms of union. It will be a subject of general congratulation if the negotiations now pending result in the incorporation of her majesty's eldest colonial possession into the Canadian confederation.

Measures relating to bankruptcy and insolvency and to joint stock companies will be laid before you. You will also be asked to consider certain amendments to the insurance act, to the act respecting dominion notes to the dominion lands act, to the Indian act, to the Northwest Territories representation act, also a bill respecting the land survey of the Canadian Pacific railway company.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I have directed that the accounts of the past year shall be laid before you. The estimates of the ensuing year will also be presented. They have been framed with every regard to economy compatible with the efficiency of the public service.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: I now leave you to the discharge of the important duties devolving upon you with an earnest prayer that being guided by the spirit of wisdom and patriotism your deliberations may under the divine blessings conduce to the unity and well being of Canada. In the commons beautiful floral wreaths adorned the seats of the late Sir John Thompson and the late Mr. Geoffrey.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Foster, who leads the house, seconded by Hon. Mr. Costigan, the consideration of the speech was set for next day.

After some routine business had been transacted, the house adjourned till the following day. In the House of Commons on Friday last Mr. Bennett, of East Simcoe, moved the address in reply to the speech from the throne, and was followed by Mr. Bellefleur of Chicoutimi, Hon. Messrs. Laurier, Foster, Tupper and Sir Richard Cartwright. Sir C. H. Tupper upheld the language of the Opposition speakers in the House. He trusted that no member of the Manitoba Legislature would be misled into believing that the Government in any way intended to assume the role of dictator. That legislature had to deal finally with the matter, would be unwise to thrust upon the subject in this House.

At Richmond, P. Q., on Monday, a Grand Trunk freight train broke in two sections, which collided the engine was killed and fourteen cars were wrecked.

News comes from Denver, Col., of the marriage of John P. Costigan, formerly of Souris, to Miss Mary of Denver. They have gone to Europe on a wedding trip. Congratulations.

THE steam ferry boat Elfin, was running from dock to dock, on the Southport ferry, on Monday. The Elfin was carrying a large quantity of Rocky Point rock, and the Southport has been launched.

THE exhibition, under the auspices of the Exhibition Association of the city and county of St. John, N. B., will open in that city on September 24th, and close on October 4th of the present year.

A NUMBER of prominent cattle men from western Canada, have arrived in Charlottetown looking for cattle for English shipment. The prices have gone up owing to the American scarcity, and there is keen competition.

THE schooner Ethel Agrie, Capt. Phelan, arrived here from Chagnac, Saturday evening. This was the first sailing vessel to enter Charlottetown harbor this season. Last year Captain Phelan was the first to make the outward trip from here. He is evidently a hustler.

MR. D. D. RYAN, the popular purser, for many years of the steamer St. Lawrence, as well as the steamer, during winter months, has been transferred to the Northumberland, in succession to the late Alexander McDonald. Mr. W. H. Stewart has been appointed purser of the St. Lawrence.

THE Wm. Allen, owned by Batt Bros. of this city was the first steamer, except the Stanley, to arrive at Pictou this season. She arrived at this port from Pictou on Saturday evening, with a cargo of flour for Carvell Bros., and cleared again for the same place on Monday with 3,000 bushels of oats for the same firm.

THE steamer Northumberland left here at four o'clock Monday morning for Point du Chene, via St. John's, and returned on Saturday evening. She arrived at the last named place about 9 o'clock, and half an hour later, left for Point du Chene, making the run over in about three hours. She returned to Summerside the same evening about seven o'clock.

A MAN named Williams, a ship carpenter, of Halifax, lost a leg by the falling of a beam while at work on the schooner Topaz two years ago. He sued the owners, Messrs. Bortling, of Liverpool, N. S., for \$2,000 damages. The case has long been before the courts. The jury on Wednesday last, on a second trial, awarded Williams \$2,800.

THE Richibucto Review reports that John Taylor, of Kingsport, has a grade Jersey cow which supplies the family with milk and produces one hundred dollars' worth of butter and milk yearly. For eight months last year this cow's milk was made into 25 lbs. of butter, besides selling three quarts of milk daily. In the previous year her product was about the same as last year.

OBITUARY.

At St. Peter's Lake, Ronald McDonald, son of Donald, and Catherine McDonald, departed this life April 19th, at the ripe old age of eighty-five years. His wife, Ellen McDonald, died some years ago. Stomach failure was the disease which brought about his death, and he constantly bore it with the solid, true and upright heart of a Christian. The deceased had many relatives and acquaintances, and when the sad, though somewhat unexpected news of his demise was announced to them, they must have said or thought in their own minds that "he walked consistently the path of life" because he held for making a warm love with friendly greetings; and to God he paid the tribute of a long and happy life in this world. He leaves in his household two daughters, Catherine, and Annie, wife of Pias McDonald (a brother to Bishop McDonald) and their five children. He mourns the loss of an ever sincerely affectionate parent. On Sunday afternoon his remains were conveyed to St. Andrew's Church, and considering the impassable condition of the roads were followed by a large number of people. The funeral services were performed by the Rev. Very Rev. Most Rev. McDonald, after which the body was deposited in the adjoining cemetery. May his soul rest in peace—Com.

Dalton McCarthy's friends say that he will divide the House on the straight issue of remedial legislation for Manitoba before the close of the session, so as to put every man on record.

The trade returns of the Dominion for the past month are the most encouraging that have been issued for some time. The increase in the exports over March of last year is \$7,684,739. The imports, however, show a reduction of \$600,000 in the month, while the duty falls off \$230,000.

The unveiling of Sir John McCondonald's monument in Montreal, takes place on the Queen's birthday on Dominion Square. It will be attended with great military display, and the Lieut.-Governors of the various provinces will be in attendance. The members of the House of parliament will also attend in a body.

A fatal accident occurred at the Dominion Coal company's international pier at Sydney, O. B., on Thursday last, by which a young man, John McLean of Lingan road, was almost instantly killed. A number of men were engaged planing a portion of the pier, among the number being McLean. He was walking along by the edge, and, happening to step on a loose plank, was precipitated some thirty-five feet and fell prostrate across a heap of logs, striking on his head and badly fracturing the skull. He lay for an hour, but was always unconscious. An inquest was immediately held, when a verdict of accidental death was rendered.
