THE LICENSE SCANDAL.

In the House of Commons on Tue

In the House of Commons on Tuesday, among the bills moved forward a stage was the one which Sir John was forced to introduce to suspend the McCarthy Act, excepting the clauses held by the Supreme Court to be ultra vires. It was by hy no means a congenial task to have to hold up again to view the humiliation which he had breught upon himself, and without any explanation he moved the hill to its ascend reading.

Mr. Cameron (Huron) thought the bill abould have provided specific information of the clauses which still remain in ferce, as doubt might be created in the minds of magistrates and others who had not the decision of the Supreme Court before them. Mr. Cameron then proceeded to refer to the manner in which the Dominion Commissioners were acting under the authority still remaining. The law permitted the sale of higgor in emall quantities for medicinal purposes. He could state from personal experience email quantities for medicinal purposes. He could state from personal experience in his county, which had the Scott Act in force, that the Dominion commissioners had most acandalously taken advantages. age of the working of the act to violate its purpose. Instead of confining the licenses to sell liquors for medicinal and mechanical purposes to druggists, they had refused them to those in that trade had refused them to those in that trade and given them to tavern-keepers. When the people of Huron, by a majority of 1,600, adopted the Scott Act, they believed they were getting rid of the liquor traffic in taverns, but the Dominion Commissioners had thwarted the action of the electors by issuing licenses to 29 former tavern-keepers. This, he said, was an outrage which should not be permitted, and if the law was defective it ought to be amended. It had never been contemplated that the commissionit ought to be amended. It had never been contemplated that the commissioners of the Dominion Government would pursue a course which would nullify the loudly expressed wishes of the reople. While the law provided that one license such as described should be issued to every 4,000 inhabitants, in the village of Dungannon, with only 200 population Dungannon, with only 200 population, two licenses had been issued, and both were obtained by tavern-keepers.
