ANNUAL SPORTS OF ST. BONAVENTURE'S COLLEGE STUDENTS.

The annual sports at the Campus of St. Bonaventure's College were held yesterday under very favourable conditions. The weather was beautiful and probably the largest gathering that ever assembled there on similar occasions was attracted to the place to spend the half holiday. The College and the Campus were gaily decorated with bunting, giving to the whole scene a charming appearance. In fact it would be difficult to find a more beautiful spot in Newfoundland than St. Bon's. Campus, and yesterday it certainly looked at its best.

Amongst those present were His Excellency the Governor and Lady Williams and suite, Rt. Rev. Mons. Roche, the clergy and Christian Bros. and many prominent citizens. The Bands of the C. C. C. Mount Cashel and of H. M. S. Cornwall were present and played exquisite music during the evening.

The programme was an interesting and well varied one. The football contest after a hard struggle was won by St. Bon's by a score of two goals to one. His Excellency the Governor when presenting the prizes took occasion to congratulate the

winners and to wish them continued success. The special prizes to boys of 15, 16 and 17 years of age for securing the highest number of points were won by Masters Hayes, Keefe and Devereaux. The readiness and precision with which the field exercises were prepared reflects great on the teachers of Physical Drill and Bayonet Exercises and Figure Marching. During the afternoon teas were served by the ladies of St. Bon's Association in the College Hall and temperance drinks, ice creams, candies, etc., were sold in the stalls around the Campus. The financial receipts, we understand, were highly satisfactory. Following is the programme:—

(8) Football Fives. (a) Collegians vs. B. I. S. (b) Star vs. St. Bon's. In the former contest the Collegians defeated their opponents by 3 goals to nil. The latter event was more exciting and resulted in a win for the College boys by 2 goals to 1.

(9) ¼ Mile Run—Intermediate. 1st, Keegan; 2nd, Keough.

(10) Drill (Free Exercises—Preparatory.) This event evoked much laughter, from the little tots from the Junior departments performed the exercises with much precision.

(11) Pole Jump—Seniors. (a) Won by Neary, height 7 ft. 1 inch. (b) Races—Preparatory. The winners were W. Parrell, J. Daly, P. Skinner, C. Gleeson.

(12) Figure Marching—Seniors. Relay Race. Past vs. Present—Won by Past, the names of whom are Messrs. Burnham, Greene, Kent and Hean.

(14) Half Mile Race—Seniors. 1st, Robertson; 2nd, McDonald.

COLLEGIANS DEFEAT CASUALS BY 1 GOAL.

When the ball was once more put in motion the Collegians showed that they were not daunted by the reverse of the first half. They combined well, put a good deal of "ginger" into their work, and Penny getting the ball banged the equalizer into the net. The Collegian stock now went up, they played a fine, rattling game and James soon scored the second goal. The game shortly after ended with Collegians, 2 goals; Casuals, 1. Mr. W. J. King George Defended from the Pulpit.

Dean of Norwich Denies That He Is Intemperate or Ever Contracted a Merganatic Marriage.

London, June 20.—The Dean of Norwich yesterday made a remarkable address in a church near Norwich, in which he referred to King George as "a man to my personal knowledge of intense self-sacrifice and of high character." He then mentioned "two accusations, brought, as I think, by that part of society which is no society at all, firstly, that the King is sometimes accused of inebriety. You may take me on undoubted authority that it is a libel. So far as his close friends have noticed him, he is a man who ever, from the point of view of health, has to be abstemious. He does not desire to be anything else.

"The accusation is still more unworthy, that prior to his marriage to the present Queen he had what is called a secret or morganatic marriage, with children by it. That is absolutely, root and branch, an untruth. The King is a man, who, with

a wife of like disposition as himself, has been wont during his leisure to sit in his garden with his young children around him just the same as any of us might."

The King and Queen to-day visited the vault in St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, where the body of King Edward is interred.
