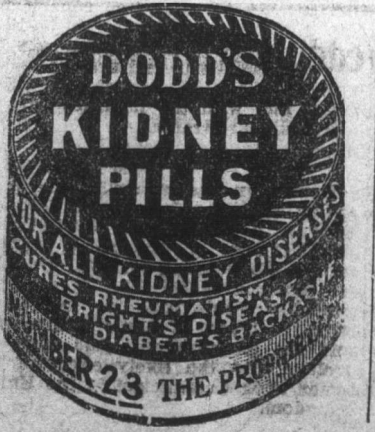

The Re-Established Army Canteen.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 19.—The story told by many commanding officers of the army of the results of the abolition of the army canteen is presented in a graphic way by Brigadier-General Ramsay D. Potts, commanding the department of Luzon in the Philippines. General Potts says that most of the court martials last year were traceable directly to the use of the native liquors, the deleterious and in many cases disastrous effects of which are said to be too well known to call for comment. "It is a violation of law to sell such liquor to soldiers, but the law cannot be enforced," says General Potts. "One who has never seen the effect of even a small quantity of native liquor upon a young American unaccustomed to its use, can form no judgment as to the seriousness of the situation now presented, a situation which is beyond the control of the military authorities, while the civil authorities can do very little. I can only suggest the removal of temptation by providing a substitute for the vile native liquors in the shape of beer and possibly a little wine through the post exchange."
