### Official Publication of the Debates.

Although the Legislature has been less than three weeks in session the official publication is lamentably behind.

The House opened on February 8th, and the Government organs have not yet disposed of the report of the debate six days later, and are still publishing that of the 14th, although it is now almost a fortnight old. To get thirteen days behind in the publication of the debate of a session nineteen days old we believe constitutes a record for the city. We have heard much of the haste of the Premier, but he is showing little energy as the leading member of the Commission of Internal Economy of the Legislature in providing the public with an official record of the doings in the Legislature, while matters are live and interesting.

### Smallpox Raging at Ochre Pit Cove.

C. Puddister, who was the first to contract small pox at Northern Bay, as well as his wife, have recovered, though the man is badly pitted about the face and body. The rest of the family escaped it. The house is still quarantined. Jordan Moore's two daughters have it now, and these are the only people ill of the malady now in Northern Bay. James Moore's house and several others were relieved from quarantine. Small pox is raging at Ochre Pit Cove, three miles above Northern Bay, and many of the residents are ill of it. They went to and fro amongst those who were stricken at Northern Bay before the residences were quarantined and thus contracted the disease. Most of those afflicted at Northern Bay treated the pustules as they would ordinary boils or other eruptions. Const. March is looking after the quarantined houses.

The longest verse is the 9th of the 8th chap. of Esther; the shortest verse is the 35th of the 11th chapter of John. In the 1st verse of the 7th chapter of Ezra is the alphabet. The finest piece of reading is the 26th chapter of Acts. The name of God is not mentioned in the Book of Esther. It contains knowledge, wisdom, holiness and love.
