Found Drowned.

GEO. GORMAN'S BODY BROUGHT TO TOWN LAST NIGHT.

Yesterday the Telegram gave an account of the report given to the police of the disappearance of George Gorman, who with a man named Walsh went fishing on Tuesday at Western Barrens Pond, near Petty Harbor. Head Constable Sparrow and Constable Faraday, who took jiggers with them and went in the search with the man Walsh, Gorman's friend and companion, were not long finding the body. Gorman, it seems, left Walsh to bathe in another part of the pond Wednesday forenoon, and after Walsh had waited some time, he left the place and arrived in St. John's in the early afternoon. Gorman's failure to come home was reported yesterday, and Hd. Sparrow and Const. Faraday, taking Walsh with them, were not long searching the section indicated by Walsh before his clothing was found. They dragged the pond with their jiggers the body was taken from the bottom of the pond in very deep water and about 40 feet off shore. The remains were nude, and the belief is that poor Gorman while swimming was seized with one of the fainting fits to which he was subject and must have drowned quickly. The remains were brought to the city last night and placed in the morgue. The deceased was a shipwright by trade, was about 55 years old, and leaves a widow and six children to mourn him. Much sympathy is expressed for the family, in which the Telegram joins.

Eccentric Millionaire is Dead.

Los Angeles, Aug. 13.—Major William Arthur Phipps, multi-millionaire, who claimed to be a cousin of Henry Phipps, the steel magnate, and who for four years has lived the life of a hermit in apartments at the Van Nuys Hotel, is dead.

"Major" Phipps was the most eccentric millionaire in the Southwest, perhaps in America. His strange manner of life and the mystery and seclusion with which he surrounded himself made him conspicuous in the hotel, where he used every means to keep his presence a secret.

He began his career as a reporter for a newspaper in Calumet, Mich., and while in that city bought stock in a development company, which had mining interests in Arizona. This made him a millionaire, and when the merger in steel took place he bought all the stock he could get hold of in the small companies, which, it is said, brought his wealth up to \$40,000,000. After having spent some time in Florida, he came to this city, engaged seven rooms at the Van Nuys, and immediately began living the life of a hermit. He left the hotel only twice up to the day of his death.

In his apartments were thirty large sample trunks filled with clothes, but during the time he lived there he wore gymnas only. Every day he bathed fifty times and he used seventy-five bath towels, fifty face towels and seventy napkins. In the bathroom of the hotel there was a standing order for eighteen bottles of Bass's ale and three quarts of whiskey to be delivered to him daily, which he consumed.

On the two occasions that he left his rooms it is not known where he went. He first sent his valet down stairs to see if "the coast was clear," and then made a hurried exit from the hotel into a taxicab.

Fire at Bishop Falls.

(Message to Daily News.)

BISHOP'S FALLS, Last Night. A big fire started about one p.m. on the south side of Explotis River, two miles east of Great Rattling Brook. There is also a fire on the north side near Diamond Crossing, the latter being under control. The mill has been closed down, and all the men from here and Grand Falls fought the fire. The wind is blowing a strong breeze from the south west causing the fire to work back from the mill, and burning some pulpywood stacked by the river's edge. A big quantity of railway ties on the Reid Nfld. Co.'s track close to the trestle, have been also destroyed, but the trestle has not been damaged. The fire on the south side of the river is still raging, and is beyond control, but the settlement is now out of danger. The cause of the south side fire is unknown. The north side fire is supposed to have been caused by the train going west this p.m. Up to the present, it is impossible to estimate the amount of damage done, or where the fire, which is now working east, will end.
