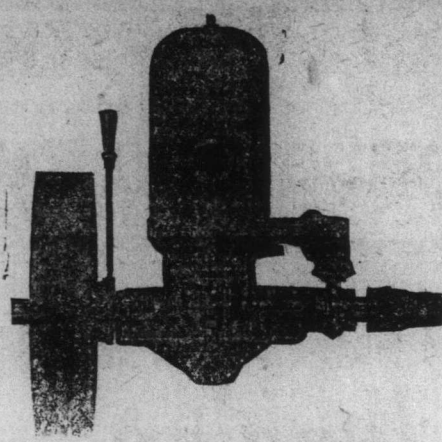

### Methodist Conference.

#### YESTERDAY'S SESSION.

The morning session opened at 9.30  
with the President in the chair, hymn  
No. 574 was sung and prayer offered  
by Rev. C. Lennox. The Journal of the  
previous session was read and adopt-  
ed. An invitation to visit Headquarters  
to inspect soldiers' comforts, etc.,  
was accepted.

The Conference then proceeded with  
the election of College Board of Gov-  
ernors.

Dr. Saint and A. Mews were elected to  
the General Board of Missions.

Treasurers of the various Confer-  
ence funds were appointed.

Conference after some discussion  
proceeded to elect delegates to the  
General Conference. Drs. Saint, Cur-  
tis and Revs. Moore, Dunn and House  
were elected and the following lay-  
men were elected—J. C. Puddister, A.  
Penny, J. Leamon, H. K. Bishop,  
A. Soper, A. Vatcher with Dr. Good-  
win and S. S. Stensford as alternates.

At 12 J. M. Shaw, M.A., Principal  
of Pine Hill College, was introduced  
to the Conference by Dr. Bond. Pro-  
fessor Shaw counted himself happy in  
having the opportunity of meeting the  
Newfoundland Conference. The sub-  
ject which the Professor took was the  
war and the church. God sits king  
above all plagues, and above the war  
comes his voice to law and empire.

Upon the church rests the responsi-  
bility of interpreting that voice. All  
are looking towards the end of the  
great war. When that day comes the  
church will face an unparalleled op-  
portunity. The church must forth-  
with organize. Our soldiers are living  
in an atmosphere of sacrifice and will  
not be satisfied in their return to  
identify themselves with a church  
that is not characterized by a spirit  
of sacrificial devotion to Christ. There  
must therefore be quickening of  
conscience as to the meaning and  
ideals of church membership—adher-  
ence to a person rather than to a  
creed. There must be a definite li-  
ability to service in order to achieve  
the ideals of Christ-church, members  
must not be on the permanent list of  
reserves, but on active service. The  
fundamental principles of Christian  
brotherhood must be emphasized. The  
brotherhood engendered at the front  
to-day must be fostered after the war  
is over. Fraternal war should not be  
followed by fraternal peace. There  
must be a new emphasis laid  
upon the cross and its constraint to  
sacrificial service. This higher note  
must be struck in all appeals to our  
peoples. The church must demand a  
revival of Gospel values and realities,  
and of soldier qualities of devotion  
and sacrifice. Professor Shaw was  
closely followed and his address high-  
ly appreciated.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Session opening at 2.30 with the  
President in the chair. After the  
usual devotional exercises the Journal  
of the previous session was read and  
adopted. Conference then proceeded  
with routine work.

Dr. Smythe, Principal of Wesleyan  
Theological College, then addressed  
the Conference setting forth the  
advantages and claims of the College  
which he represented.

Dr. Delano, Professor of Classics in  
Mount Allison University, also ad-  
dressed the Conference, and gave an  
interesting address concerning educa-  
tion and Mount Allison's ability to  
give that education.

Dr. Moore, Secretary of General  
Conference, gave a most interesting  
and inspiring address concerning so-  
cial work of the church. He laid  
great emphasis upon the need of so-  
cial reconstruction.

The following resolutions were then  
presented and carried:

WHEREAS, the Rev. N. M. Guy severs  
his connection this year with this  
Conference to take up work in another  
land and conference;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED,  
that this Conference place on record  
its deep sense of loss in Bro. Guy's de-  
parture, and its sincere prayer that  
God's blessing be with him and Mrs.  
Guy during their journey, and remain  
with them in their retirement.

Many brethren spoke in support of  
the resolution and Rev. Mr. Guy fit-  
tingly replied.

Conference also passed this resolu-  
tion:

RESOLVED, that the members of  
the Conference have learned with sin-  
cere regret that Bro. Frederick Mc-  
dew has been transferred from the  
Nfld. Conference to Montreal Confer-  
ence, and in taking leave of him de-  
sire to place on record their high ap-  
preciation of Bro. Matthews and his  
work. We beg to assure Brother Mat-  
thews that he takes with him the pray-  
ers and best wishes of his brethren  
and friends. We take this opportu-  
nity of expressing our common feel-  
ing that in his departure our Confer-  
ence loses an able minister of Jesus  
Christ and a brother not beloved only  
but also highly gifted in Evangelistic  
fervour and enthusiasm.

A resolution was also passed Rev.  
H. Scott and regret was expressed at  
his leaving the Conference.

Conference accepted an invitation  
from Mr. King to a retreat at the Kirk  
on Sunday at 4 o'clock.

#### EVENING SESSION.

Session opened at 8. President in the  
chair. After the usual devotional  
exercises were conducted the Journal  
of the previous session was read and  
on motion adopted.

After certain recommendations were  
accepted and reports adopted the Con-  
ference passed to the order of busi-  
ness. Rev. R. S. Smith presented the  
report of Social Service and Evan-  
gelism. This report was lengthy and  
dealt with such important questions  
as the enactment of the Prohibition  
law, child welfare. The report was  
read and discussed. Item by item.  
Many took part in the debate, and it  
was quite animated at times.

The Conference concentrated itself  
on the fact that no single congrega-  
tion throughout the Dominions of Can-  
ada and Newfoundland used intoxicat-  
ing wines for sacramental purposes.  
It is to be regretted that the debate  
was so prolonged that Dr. Moore was  
unable to address the Conference to  
any length. He wittily remarked that  
it was his experience in six conference  
gatherings that he visited. The hour  
being late the Conference was ad-  
journed.
