

Bishop Feild College Speech Day.

GOVERNOR PRESENTS PRIZES.

His Excellency the Governor, who is the son of a former headmaster and, himself, an old boy of Bishop Feild College, presented the prizes at the annual Speech Day of the school, which was held last night at the Casino Theatre. A large number of people, chiefly parents of pupils, old boys, and directors of the college were present. His Excellency, who was attended by Capt. Hamilton, received an arrival by a Guard of Honour from C. Co. of the C.L.B. Cadets and was conducted to his seat by Mr. R. R. Wood, B.A. the headmaster. The proceedings opened with the report of the school year ending in June last, which was read by the headmaster.

The Headmaster's Report.

The report was a highly creditable one to both teachers and pupils showing as it did, the excellent work done in both school work and athletics. Mr. Wood said that in many respects this report was the most satisfactory one that he had ever had. The number of pupils in attendance was almost the largest on record. He referred to the fact that the only three candidates who entered this year for the Rhodes Scholarship were Old Feildians. Mr. C. J. Parsons had been awarded the scholarship, but was unfortunately unable to accept it this year, and it therefore passed to Mr. R. H. LeMessurier. The third candidate, Mr. A. W. Johnson, B. Com., voluntarily withdrew for purely personal reasons. This was an almost unique distinction. These three were the outcome of the lean years of the

College when it was supposed to have done very little. The Jubilee Scholarship was also won this year by a pupil of the college, Miss Olive Mews, who was the first girl to attend B.F.C. The results of the C.H.E. Examinations were very creditable to the college. In the Senior Associate Grade, the two candidates who entered passed in the Honours Division. Seven of the twelve candidates who passed the Junior A.A. secured Honours marks. Fifteen scholars passed the Intermediate Grade exams, thirty-seven the Preliminary, and twenty-five were successful in the Primary Grade. Sergt. T. Ricketts, Newfoundland's only V.C., who received his whole education at B.F.C., passed the Preliminary Grade exam.

The total number of passes was 51. In athletics the college had not succeeded in winning any championship, but the various teams it entered had given the winners a hard fight for first place. This applied particularly to Association Football, when the Championship game was won by a single goal, scored in the last sixty seconds of the match. The fact that the Old Feildians were raising funds for the purpose of providing the school with a new football field was also referred to by Mr. Wood. He spoke of the splendid work done by the College Companies of the C.L.B. Cadets, which had made excellent progress. Welcome was extended to the new members of the staff, Miss Joyner, and Messrs. Hopkins, Gardner and Murdoch. An appreciation of the work done on behalf of the College by the Spencer Club, Mrs. Sterling Fraser, and Revs. Brinton and Field was expressed by Mr. Wood in closing his report. He also expressed his regret at the approaching departure from the Colony of Sir C. A. Harris,

whose first public appearance after his arrival here as Governor was to present the prizes at a B.F.C. Speech Day.

The Boy's Performance.

The performance given by the boys of the college followed. The programme consisted of choruses, recitations and exhibitions of drill. Every item was excellently performed, and the Physical Drill and Gymnastic Marching was exceptionally good and earned rounds of well-merited applause from a greatly pleased audience. The choruses were also very good, and gave evidence of the time and care taken by Mr. H. W. Stirling in training the voices of the boys. The programme was as follows:—

The Prize Distribution.

The distribution of prizes followed the entertainment. In asking the Governor to present the prizes, His Lordship Bishop White took occasion to congratulate the staff of the College

upon the excellent work performed by them during the past year. The various awards, which will be found in the list appended, were then presented to their fortunate winners by His Excellency. After he had concluded this task, Sir Charles made a very happy address, in the course of which he expressed his regret that he was participating in a B.F.C. Speech Day for the last time, and he offered his congratulations to the college on their former success and wished them luck in the future. Addresses were also made by Dr. W. W. Blackall, Superintendent of Education, Mayor Cook, a director and ex-pupil of the college, and Rev. Canon Jeeves. Following the customary vote of thanks to His Excellency, and the College Choir, the National Anthem brought the affair to a close.
