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The Psychology of Subconscious Acts.

What is the subconscious mind of which we have lately been hearing so much? There is perhaps no subject in phy-

chology about which there is greater difference of opinion. Not the least difficulty lies in de-

ciding what we mean by the "uncon-We are only fully conscious at

any given time of those factors in our surroundings upon which our attention is directly focussed and partly conscious of many others which we speak of as being on the outer fringe of our consciousness, writes a physician in the London

Further, in concentrating on any ven action, such as playing golf, repress all other factors which end to interfere with our play-we oncentrate on the ball.

We speak loosely of being unconious of that part of our surround ngs on which our attention is not ssed. Thus people are common heard to declare that they did a ning unconsciously, when they mean hat they did it without paying atention, and such actions can usually subsequently recalled.

The term unconscious is better rerved for experiences which have een repressed and cannot be rembered in the ordinary way, but only emerge from the subconscious nder conditions such as sleep, hyposis, or psycho-analysis.

This subconscious mind is full of emories, ideals, and wishes of which we are totally unaware, but which nay nevertheless powerfully affect opinions and behaviour.

We call these acts "automatic," hich, though voluntary in the beginning, have been so frequently caried out that they can be performed without arousing attention, or sub-Everyday life provides us with
