At an early hour there was a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Mortuary Chapel, Rev. Dr. Facey and Rev. Gosse, of Change Islands, officiating, when a large number partook of the Holy Sacrament, in the presence of relatives and friends who have passed through the valley of the shadow of death. At 3 o'clock a vast congregation assembled for the Flower Service, which was impressive throughout. St. Mary's Choir was in charge of the musical arrangements and under the direction of Organist Lloyd left nothing to be desired. Rev. Canon Jeeves, E. J. R. Nichol, H. L. Pike and W. E. Godfrey officiated and Rev. Godfrey delivered an address most appropriate to the occasion, during which he showed the greatness of Christianity over heathen beliefs, and exhorted all to live that when the call comes they will be prepared to enter the unknown world in sure and certain hope of the Resurrection. The service will long be remembered by those who were privileged to be present.

BRINGS TOP PRICE AT AUCTION.

BERLIN, July 1.—(A.P.)—Martin Luther's handwriting commanded a high price even than autographs by Goethe and Schiller at an auction of autographs here. A letter addressed to the Elector John of Saxony brought 9,100 marks. The second highest price, 5,000 marks, was paid for a verified and authenticated letter by Goethe to Merck in the year 1774. Schiller's poem, "Der Alpenjäger" (The Alpine Hunter), came third, with 3,000 marks. A Schopenhauer autograph brought only 500 marks. A number of Schiller and Wieland letters found no bidders. Six pages of Helms' poems were auctioned off at 670 marks.

The Lausanne Treaty.

In order to safeguard American commercial, educational, religious and philanthropic interests in Turkey, our relations with that country should be regulated without further delay. The quickest and most effective means for bringing that about would be the prompt ratification of the Treaty of Lausanne. As the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, in its summary of its annual meeting at Cleveland last month, said: "The Lausanne Treaty" secures to us the same rights as all other countries and is such a treaty as would be negotiated with any other sovereign state. While it is not as satisfactory a treaty as might have been secured under other conditions, it is wholly consistent with American principles of the 'open door' and the territorial and political integrity of sovereign states."—Com. and Financial Weekly.

Cold Air Solves California's Market Problem.

Every year there moves eastward from California, a long caravan of 200,000 cars of perishable commodities, mostly fruit. Something like 5,000,000 tons of ice are required to neutralize the effect of a sultry sun across long stretches of desert and to offset the none too balmy breezes that often blow across the Central and Eastern States during the warmer months of the year. It has been estimated that in the citrus industry the loss from decay formerly ran as high as 40 per cent. And though the fruit reached the market safely it was often in a condition where it would decay almost immediately upon being taken out of the cars. This was the condition. But the problem is to-day being solved by the adoption of a refrigerating method called "pre-cooling." The method is simplicity itself. Air at a low temperature is forced by a huge fan through the rooms where the fruit is placed upon being brought from the orchard. The effect is a sudden lowering of the temperature of the fruit to the desired point. Thus decay germs have no time to begin

work, and the various oils given off by the fruit, which have a tendency to spoil it are driven off. When placed in ice cars it is at a lower temperature even than the refrigerated cars and can make the journey without re-icing. If desired, the fruit when pre-cooled can simply be transferred to cold storage rooms and left for a number of days before shipping. All of these facts mean speed and control for the shipper of perishable stuff, and those two words mean stabilized markets and better prices. —Francis D. Nichol, in Forbes Magazine, New York.
