

Every year there moves eastward 200,000 cars of perishable commodities, mostly fruit. Something like 5,000,000 tons of ice are required to neutralize the effect of a sultry sun across long stretches of desert and to offset the none too balmy breezes that often blow across the Central and Eastern States during the warm-

er months of the year. It has been estimated that in the citrus industry the loss from decay formerly ran as high as 40 per cent. And though the fruit reached the market safely it was often in a condition where it would decay almost immediately upon being taken out
