He was bred by William B. Smith, of Hartford. He had a record of \$2,200, and was graded in 1915, and was the winner of a \$10,000 stallion race at Buffalo and other rich stakes and purses.

The horse has a good record, and on public form should nearly win. 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THE STILETTO!

Terrible Murder in Hoboken, New Jersey.

HOBOKEN, N. J., April 21.—Early yesterday morning Angelo Gaboth, of New York, murdered his mother-in-law, dangerously stabbed his father-in-law and was slain by Conquistador Chinchella, aged 18 years, a son of the murdered woman. A general melee followed, in which Gaboth's wife and her brother received stab wounds. The daughter of Chinchella, who is the daughter of Chinchella, was visiting the Chinchellas. Gaboth is a worthless fellow. It is believed he visited the Chinchellas for the purpose of robbing his father-in-law. Mrs. Gaboth slept with her mother, and Gaboth with her father-in-law. In another room the sons of Chinchella, named Conquistador and Anselmo, had retired for the night. About 12:30 in the morning, Gaboth, armed with a stiletto, entered the room and stabbed his mother-in-law. Gaboth then turned to the sleeping women, he plunged the weapon into her abdomen and then with a semi-circular sweep of the weapon almost disemboweled her. The woman uttered but a single shriek and died almost immediately. Her cry partly aroused her husband, but he fell asleep again. Gaboth's wife, who was sleeping with her mother, made no sound, but remained perfectly still. The blood from her mother's horrible wound literally covered her, but still she did not stir. It is believed that Gaboth was aware of what her husband was doing. Gaboth returned to the room in which his wife lay, and stabbed her in the vital spot, though the weapon made a jagged wound in Mr. Chinchella's throat. THE WORKING WORLD.

Indiana Midland Railway Strike Set Back.—The High-Knot Movement.

The Indiana Midland Railway strike has been satisfactorily settled.

Vessel men at Racine, Wis., are having a hard time in securing help for unloading vessels on account of the regulations of a stevedores' union which has advanced rates 33 1/2 per cent over last year.

While the schooner Fay was lying in the central elevator slip at Chicago on Monday sitting out with a union crew on board 50 men made a sudden raid on the vessel, overpowered the non-unionists and all of them were thrown on the dock and driven away.

Six hundred of the 950 laborers engaged in grading Jackson Park, Chicago, for the World's Fair struck for an increase in wages from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day.

The discontent of the Kentucky union railway employees who have, it is said, been unable to get their pay for some time, has culminated in serious trouble. Unpaid employees of the road and mountaineers in Breathitt county who have never been paid for their lumber wrecked the entire road in Breathitt county for a distance of 25 miles. Bridges were burned and culverts destroyed. The road will be crippled for weeks, and the cost of repairing will amount to \$50,000.

The men who were advertised for in Toronto to go to Chicago were to have been engaged on the World's Fair building. There were 2,000 applicants. Jones, the advertiser, left the city Friday. He admitted there might be trouble with the unions in Chicago about the 1st of May so far as the bricklayers were concerned.

The Toronto Trades and Labor Council has passed the following: "That this council is in entire sympathy with the eight-hour movement, and that in order to place such a system on a satisfactory and enduring basis legislative enactment is desirable and necessary."

Rioting by the strikers continues in the coke region. No. 2 plant of the Frick Coke Company at Scottsdale, Pa., has been kept in operation continuously since Saturday night.

In view of the approach of May day demonstrations, organizers are busy throughout all the cities of Europe organizing for a general strike. All the European Governments have decided to prohibit outdoor demonstrations.

The Ottawa journeymen tailors went out on strike Monday morning. They refused their demand for 15 per cent advance in wages. Mr. Walter Smith, the president, says his organization is 45 strong in Ottawa, and that he has the backing of the International Tailors' Union.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 21.—It is reported here that the fishermen at Bay de Este are determined to sell bait to the French from St. Pierre and have resisted the Government officials who have been sent to assist the authorities.

Influenza Epidemic in England.

LONDON, April 21.—Influenza is raging in London. One-half of the members of the National Liberal Club and the majority of the inmates of one of the largest hotels are down with the disease. Telegrams from London and Sheffield report a similar state of affairs there.

Sudbury Sales.

OTTAWA, April 21.—The "scare" dispatches regarding the effects of the new Millinery sales out from Sudbury have not seem to be borne out by events. Mr. D. O'Connor, of Sudbury, has made a sale of his millinery claim to a Chicago company for \$20,000, and the goods are to be put to work at once on the claim.

Sensational Suicide.

NEW YORK, April 21.—A young couple registered at the Grand Union Hotel on Sunday morning at P. Bohay and his wife, and were assigned to room D, 8, on the third floor. At 8:30 they were found dead from gas asphyxiation. They were in bed wrapped in a sheet, and their bodies were haled the gas through rubber tubes, held in their mouths. On the woman's breast was a beautiful bouquet, evidently purchased for the occasion. The man was about 25 years old, and the woman 22. They left four letters, two of which were to Mrs. Miller, of 210 East Ninth street. Mrs. Miller admitted virtually that she was acquainted with the couple, and gave the impression that the name given by the young man was correct, but that the young woman was not his wife.

Reciprocity Between Spain and the United States.

MADRID, April 21.—The proposed reciprocity convention between Spain and the United States contains the following provisions: In return for the privilege of free entry into the United States of Antilles sugars, molasses, coffee and hides and a reduction of the tariff on tea, the United States will obtain exemption from duties on most of her raw and manufactured products and a reduction of the tariff on cereals and flour.

American flour is placed upon a nearly equal footing with Spanish flour. Under the new convention American wheat, beans, lard, flour, petroleum, manufactured products and machinery will enter practically free of duty. Among other Spanish exports, olive oil will be replaced by American lard, and beans, now exported to Cuba in large quantities, will cease to be sent. The advantages resulting to Cuba will be great, but it is impossible to estimate the injury to Spanish interests.
