NO MADMAN'S ACT.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Reliable advices from Tokio, Japan, declare that the attempted assassination of Li Hung Chang was not the act of a madman, as published in Japanese newspapers, but was the result of a widespread and premeditated conspiracy, the publication of which was suppressed by the Government.

PARDONED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 21.—Honolulu, April 21.—Col. V. V. Ashford, the Canadian imprisoned for connection with the late rebellion, has been pardoned out of prison on condition that he leave the islands not to return. He intended to sail today for Germany, but had to be taken to the Queen's Hospital. His condition is critical. He was serving a sentence of seven years for treason.

JOHN L. DID A BRAVE ACT.

POSTON, Mass., April 21.—John L. Sullivan saved a woman's life today. About noon today, when Mrs. Margaret Donnelly, a cook, employed at No. 51 Dyer street, was preparing some food, a kettle of hot fat fell to the floor, and the contents scattered over her clothing, setting it on fire. John L. was in one of the upper rooms of the house, and the woman's screams attracted his attention. He rushed to the kitchen and quenched the flames with his hands. His hands and arms were badly burned. The woman was removed to the city hospital, where she lies in a precarious condition.

Many deaths are reported in Macao, in the Portuguese settlement of China, at the mouth of the Canton River, as the result of the plague. Russian newspapers are growling at the cessation of the man and territory to Japan by China. Russia may demand some herself.
