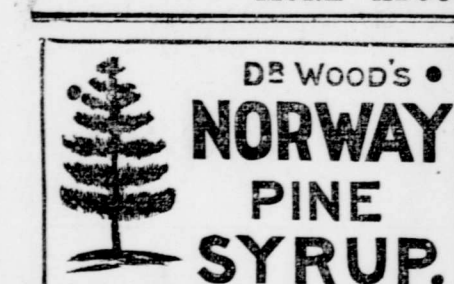

The City Tax Rate for 1897 Struck.

It Is Practically the Same as Last Years,

And Shows Great Economy and Splendid Financiering.

Extraordinary Expenditure to be Met This Year.

But for This the Rate Would Be Even Lower.

London's Taxation Much Lighter Than in Other Cities.

The Mayor's Interesting Address—The Tax Collection Reform Postponed by a Manoeuvre—Doctors Want a Bacteriologist—A Batch of Important Business.

Before the council meeting on Monday night, the Mayor presented the following statement:

Debt \$1,200,000
Public Schools 2,500,000
Collegiate Institute 1,500,000
Free Library 500,000
Other purposes 5,425,000
Total \$10,625,000

Such is the tax rate of London for 1897—21½ mills on the dollar.

Considering the extraordinary expenditure this year, the expenditure over which the council proper has no control—the rate indicates the most careful and economical management of the city's affairs.

The Mayor and aldermen are to be congratulated in keeping the rate so low in spite of the greatest drawbacks and the ill-founded rumors that the rate would be over 25 mills.

A body which has been persistently held up without the slightest foundation.

Before the council convened the various committees and municipal bodies had informal meetings to endeavor to reduce their estimates for the coming year.

The estimate of the Board of Works whittled \$3,500 off repairs and general improvements, and \$200 off street cleaning.

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on Richmond street, in No. 2 ward. There were numerous public buildings there.

A HEARTY INVITATION.

At the request of Mr. C. R. Sayer, the council unanimously extended an invitation to the International Y. M. C. A. to hold its convention in London, in 1899.

MEDICAL MEN PETITION.

Dr. English, for the Medical Association, asked for the appointment of a city bacteriologist, and the establishment of a laboratory here.

Dr. Ferguson first appeared in support of the request. He said it had been under the consideration of the Medical Association for a long time.

The cost would be about \$600 for the first year, \$300 for the laboratory, and \$200 in salary. Dr. Ferguson pointed out clearly the necessity for such, especially in diphtheria, tuberculosis, and typhoid.

So far from being saved by the condition of the city, the condition of diphtheric patients was often aggravated by it. A bacteriologist was essential for the prompt diagnosis of such cases.

Dr. Gardiner said the Medical Association was asking this in the interests of the public. The medical practitioner, with all his duties, could not be a skilled microscopist, and this institution was wanted not only for diphtheria, but for tuberculosis and other diseases, and also in connection with the work of the health department.

Dr. Hodge said the Medical Association asked for the appointment of a city bacteriologist, and the establishment of a laboratory here.

He urged the importance of a bacteriologist, especially in the case of diphtheria, tuberculosis, and typhoid.

It was impossible to make an early diagnosis. If they could secure a bacteriologist, they could at the proper time they might reduce the death rate from 40 to 5 per cent.

Ald. Bennett thought the matter pertained more to the Board of Health. To that body it was sent.

CIGARETTES.

The Board of Health reported on cigarette smoking. It was found that while nothing poisonous had been found in cigarettes, they were baneful to the young.

The board's report, outlining the proposed garbage system, was also referred to No. 3.

NO. 3 COMMITTEE.

Ald. McCallum presented the report of No. 2.

The first clause granted permission for street watering on several streets; the second clause granted permission for relief work; the third that the tobacco dealers be given until July 1 to sell off their stock of cigarettes; the fourth, submitting the Fire Underwriters' communication. The latter was referred to the committee of the department with a chemical engine, salvage apparatus, etc. It was referred to the committee. The other clauses were carried.

BOARD OF WORKS.

The Board of Works' report carried in its entirety. It contained nothing of importance.

THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The finance committee's report was read by Ald. Bennett.

Arthur Cass' petition for a grant to the Salvation Army Band was carried.

Clause 5 recommended that the tender of the London Guarantee and Accident Company of London, England, for \$35,000, at 40 cents per \$100, be accepted, and that the committee, Auditor of the City of London, England, be authorized to cover the officials in the treasurer's office.

The matter was referred back to the committee to bring in a detailed statement. There was a general opinion that the clause was a farce, and that the whole of the cost of the rate, in proportion to the salaries they received.

The seventh clause submitted the petition of James Cushing for a refund of the expenses he had incurred in sending his child to the Pasteur Institute, New York.

Mr. Cushing was granted \$200.

The eighth clause, to the effect that the Poor Man's Shelter (Salvation Army Hotel), and the ninth reported progress in various directions.

INQUIRIES AND MOTIONS.

In reply to Ald. Drayton, Ald. Parnell said the opening of Marshall street was under consideration.

Ald. Bennett said that the Free Library Board subscribers for the Boston Pilot and New York Sun?

The mayor said he could not say, but would find out.

Ald. Winnett moved that the City Hall be granted to the jubilee chorus.

COMMUNICATIONS.

Mr. Wm. Player asked for permission to admit his wife to the Home for Inebriates, referred to the mayor and inspector.

A. Greenlee, et al., asked that the rate of the street south be watered. Granted.

Alex. Gunn asked permission to sell his property on the market. No.

THE TAX COLLECTORSHIP.

The bylaw for the reform of the tax collecting system by appointing one permanent paid official was read.

Ald. Bennett moved that the name of Mr. George H. Hays be inserted, and the salary be made \$1,050 per annum.

Ald. Turner—Why don't you come out and move to put a good Crit in, and not beat about the bush?

Ald. Turner moved that the salary be \$1,500, and that the collector pay his own help. It was not intended that his salary should be \$1,050; he could not do the work at that figure.
