A Sad and Sudden Death.

About 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. F. S. George Thompson, formerly of London, arrived in the city from his home in Detroit to visit his mother, 445 Queen's Avenue. When he alighted on the station he suddenly became dizzy and ill, and lost no time in securing a hack, in which he was driven to his mother's residence. He rapidly became worse, and despite all that the doctors could do died before 9 p.m.

Mr. Thompson was well known in London, having been connected with the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company here before his removal to Detroit some four years ago. His death under such circumstances is peculiarly sad. He had not been feeling well for some time and was advised to try a brief trip to London for a change and rest. His wife and son Edward were visiting in the city, and the pleasures of the reunion were thus changed into the sorrow of death. Mr. Thompson leaves five sons and three daughters—George, Charles, Bert, Alexander, Edward, Katie and Edith—all of whom live in Detroit. The absent ones were at once sent for.
