CONVENTION AT DORCHESTER

North Dorchester Union Sabbath School Association Met Yesterday.

The annual convention of the North Dorchester Union Sabbath School Association, held in the Methodist Church yesterday afternoon, was largely attended and of great interest. Besides 50 delegates, 300 or 400 other persons interested in Sunday school work were present. Rev. Thomas Wilson, of the King Street Methodist Church, presided. Rev. Mr. Kay, of Dorchester, addressed over 100 children, who filed in for the occasion. Mr. D. A. McDemmond, superintendent of the Dundas Center Methodist Sunday school, gave a practical talk on the "Business End of a Sunday School." Mr. W. Thompson read a paper on the "Sunday School Library," after which the business session occupied the afternoon. In the evening Rev. Dr. Saunders, of London, and Rev. Mr. Currie, of Belmont, addressed the convention. The Belmont choir furnished the music. It was decided to hold the next convention at Gladstone.

TICKET FRAUDS.

Denver, Col., Oct. 19.—The officials of the Colorado Midland Railway have discovered a case of ticket counterfeiting which promises to prove one of the most extensive ever unearthed. The ticket counterfeited is a skeleton round-trip ticket. The frauds found have been all on eastern points and were so nearly perfect that conductors and employees in the general offices passed them without question. The number out is believed to be large.

Boers Attack Glencoe Camp

The Enemy Said To Be 9,000 Strong.

Their Position Taken by the British After Heavy Fighting.

Gen. Symons Wounded—The Boers Lose Five Guns.

Unconfirmed Reports of Numerous Boer Repulses.

Story That the Enemy Lost 1,500 Men at Mafeking.

Vryburg Captured by the Boers—Another Train Said to Have Fallen Into Their Hands.

Ladysmith, Oct. 20.—At 5:20 this morning a dispatch was received from Gen. Symons, announcing that the Boers were shelling Glencoe camp with big guns, and that the troops were moving out to attack them.

London, Oct. 20.—A special dispatch from Glencoe, dated 8:25 this morning, announced that the Boer position had been captured after heavy fighting, during which five guns were taken. Later an official message was received from Glencoe, time 7:40 this morning, saying the fighting was still proceeding there, and announcing that the Boer strength was about 9,000 men. The Boers, it appears, posted guns on a hill overlooking the town, opened fire on the camp, and the battle became general. The war office, during the morning, received a report that

GEN. SYMONS WAS WOUNDED in the engagement at Glencoe. The war office also received the following dispatch, dated yesterday evening, from Ladysmith:

"The Boers commenced descending the western passes on Tuesday, and came in contact with our patrols yesterday. They continued to advance, halting for the night with their left flank at Besters Station, their center at Bluebank, and their right more retired. At Acton Homes, Lieut. Galloway, of the Natal Carbineers, is missing and Trooper Fencer, of the Natal Carbineers, was slightly wounded. I moved my camp into a position I have selected, with the pet of covering the town of Ladysmith, and I hoped today that the Boers might have been sufficiently near to me to strike a blow."

ENEMY RETREAT.

"Today, however, the enemy seems to have retired west, our patrols getting in touch nowhere except with the Boers at Besters Station. Communication with Glencoe Junction was cut off at Elandslaagte, where they captured a goods train. A Boer force is advancing over Beggar'sberg. No communication by telegraph is still open with Greytown."

BATTLE IN PROGRESS.

London, Oct. 20.—The war office has received the appended dispatch from Ladysmith, filed at 10:45 a.m., today.

"The following advices from Glencoe camp just to hand: The King's Royal Rifles and the Dublin Fusiliers are attacking a hill occupied by Boer artillery. They are within three hundred yards of the position and are advancing under cover of our artillery, at about 2,000 yards range. Scouts report that nine thousand Boers are advancing on Hamingspruit. The Fifteenth Battery and the Leicester Regiment have gone to meet them."

An unconfirmed report has been received here that Boer artillery is shelling Dundee.

EXCITEMENT IN LONDON.

Yesterday (Thursday) was one of the most exciting days known at the war office since the crowd attended there to know the result of the relief expedition to Gordon at Khartoum. The news that the Fifth Lancers had been engaged brought many ladies and friends of the regiment to inquire for news. The greatest intelligence seemed to be the report of a capture of a train with officers at Elandslaagte, where it is understood the whole cross country line was regularly patrolled. As no correspondents are allowed at the front, it is impossible to gain definite information, but it is known that Gen. Sir George Stewart White has been making some extensive movements of the troops in that neighborhood. It is reported that Commandant General Joubert's northern column with twelve guns, is now at Dannhauser. Although the Boers have shown considerable activity in Natal, there is nothing to indicate that they are yet prepared for a serious combined attack, and the general belief here is that unless something unexpected happens, Gen. Sir George Stewart White will maintain the defensive.

NOTES.

The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Vryburg surrendered Sunday. The police, having withdrawn from Vryburg, the town surrendered to the Boers, the inhabitants fleeing towards Kuruman."

A Ladysmith dispatch says: The Free State Boers, on the falling back of the British patrols, occupied Acton Homes on Wednesday. Their probable intention is to co-operate with the discontented Natal Dutch in Umvoti.

The Boers are boasting that they will hold fancy dress balls and masquerade in British uniforms at Cape Town and Durban by the end of October.

Another \$125,000 of Transvaal gold has been seized aboard the steamer Avondale Castle at Delagoa Bay.

It is reported from Delagoa Bay that the Swazi king, Bunu, is collecting his forces for the attack, presumably of the Boers. It is stated that the Portuguese forces at Delagoa Bay will be raised to war strength.

Pietermaritzburg is crowded with refugees, to shelter whom all the public buildings are being utilized. There is much distress.

Seven thousand men have entered Natal from the Transvaal within the past week, and most of them have gone to Zululand.

At Cape Town there is an incessant procession of applicants for active military service, and the government of three thousand mounted infantry, which the imperial government has sanctioned, will be quickly raised.

The commandant at Best Kraal sent a message to Atteridge, requesting the townsfolk to prepare coffee for his men, who arrived there this morning.

CHAMBERLAIN'S DEFENSE

Of Himself and the Policy of the Government.

Racial Antisimpy the Curse of South Africa—War Has Long Been Inevitable.

London, Oct. 20.—At yesterday's session of the House of Commons, Lord George Hamilton, replying to a question on the expenditure for the Indian troops in South Africa, said the entire charge would be defrayed out of the imperial exchequer.

Mr. Balfour, in reply to an interpellation as to whether the imperial government were now reviewing the action of the Cape Colony premier, Mr. Schreiner, and other members of the Cape government, and as to whether the governor of Cape Colony, Sir Alfred Milner, would be allowed to dismiss the Schreiner ministry, to dissolve the Cape Legislature, and temporarily to assume full authority, said: "This question is apparently founded upon newspaper reports, for which, so far as the imperial government are aware, there is no foundation."

Mr. Balfour announced that the present sitting of parliament would be regarded as a complete session, to be terminated by prorogation, and not adjourned until February.

Mr. Henry Seaton-Kerr asked whether the attention of the government had been directed to certain speeches by Messrs. Patrick O'Brien and Wm. Redmond (Parnellite), regarding the cause of the Boers, attempting to seduce the soldiers, and inciting them, acting as assistants to the enemies of the Queen, and what action, if any, the government proposed to take in the matter.

Mr. Redmond said that before the first lord of the treasury replied, he desired to ask him whether it was not a fact that he (Mr. Redmond), in suggesting a message of sympathy to President Kruger, had only followed the precedent set by her majesty's grand-
