Kruger Couldn't Stop Them!

Retreating Boers Refused to Delay Their Flight.

French's Cavalry Chasing the Fugitives—Only 20 Miles From the Free State Capital—Description of the Flanking Movement—Enemy Surprised and Outmaneuvered.

Evacuation of the Northern Part of Cape Colony Nearly Complete—Boers Entrenching at Biggarsberg—5,000 Kaffirs Working on Pretoria Trenches—Cronje Said to Have Been Betrayed—Kruger's Address to His People.

Poplar Grove Camp, March 8-9 a.m.—Gen. French is still in pursuit of the Boers, who are in disorderly retreat. He is now near Abraham's Kraal and only 20 miles from Bloemfontein.

The Bloemfontein police tried to stop the retreat of the Free Staters, but they declared that they were not willing to fight any longer, and they blamed President Steyn.

FLANKING THE ENEMY. London, March 9.—The Standard publishes the following dispatch from Poplar Grove, dated March 8: "The movements of the mounted men were somewhat rapid for the supporting infantry, and as a result the Boer position was turned before the main body could strike effectively. The Boers fell back precipitately, and extending to the southeast, they checked the advance of the British cavalry with the heavy rifle fire at 300 yards range. Accordingly Gen. French moved southward, and outflanked them, the Boers repeating their tactics."

LANCERS FELL BACK. Bloemfontein, Wednesday, March 8.—In the course of the operations the Ninth Lancers attempted to get close to the Boers' right, with the object of charging, but the Boers came out in great force, and the Lancers were compelled to retire. A battery was then sent forward to hold the enemy in check, while the Grahamstown volunteers and a company of mounted infantry, supported by a mounted battery, engaged the Boers on their right flank, the Boers fired shell, falling short, however, and they made a stubborn defense on the kopje on our right, engaging the battery, killing 48 of the battery horses. The mounted infantry gradually repelled the Boers, and the battery then took a position and expelled them from their laager in confusion. The Boers held a strong position on the north bank of the river, but the fire from the southern bank compelled them to retreat. They showed great adroitness in getting away, and displayed a gallantry and bold front while the rest of the force was busy at retreating. Gen. French's division consisted of three brigades of cavalry, two of light mounted infantry, and seven horse batteries.

OUTGENERATED. Bloemfontein, Wednesday, March 8.—Lord Roberts' movement today again thoroughly surprised, outwitted and outmaneuvered the Boers, who fled almost without firing a shot. The plan of battle was as follows: Gen. Colville's division extended along the north bank; Gen. Tucker held the center reserve, and the Guards Brigade had the center advance. Gen. Kelly-Kenny's division was ordered to make a huge flanking movement on the Boers' left, forcing Gen. French, who was instructed to move southeast until opposite the Boer flank, and then to swing around the rear. Every movement was admirably executed and entirely successful. The Boers were surprised, as was evident from the state of the deserted camps. Twice the British cavalry were almost in a position to charge, but they admit that they were foiled by the maneuvering of the Boers.

REVIEW OF THE SITUATION. London, Friday, March 9-4.15 a.m.—The Boers appear to have made no stand whatever except that while in retreat they twice repulsed Gen. French's cavalry with rifle fire. As his report has been made of the capture of prisoners, the enemy probably got away with their entire force. Gen. French is still following them, and keeping between them and Bloemfontein. The evacuation of the northern districts of Cape Colony is now nearly complete. The British are in possession of the railroad crossings.

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ance of the olden time is the same God now." The speech of the venerable president brought tears to the eyes of men and women alike. The Free State "Volklied" (national anthem) was then sung. The visit of President Kruger has cheered the despondents. President Kruger more recently has been visiting the commandos south of Bloemfontein. Fighting is proceeding at Mafeking. All the outside forts except one have been taken by the Boers.

A demonstration is preparing at Durban for Lampton and members of the Naval Brigade, who endured the siege of Ladysmith, and who are expected to arrive there tonight on a triumph. It is stated the Gen. White will soon go to Durban for the benefit of his health. James Silbert, born in Russia, and alleged to be an American citizen, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment at hard labor for signaling the enemy during the siege of Kimberley. When the routine business had been concluded in the United States senate Thursday, Mr. Mason (Illinois) moved to discharge the committee on foreign relations for further consideration of his resolution expressing sympathy for the Boers.

HER MAJESTY IN OLD LONDON

Welcomed by the Lord Mayor and Corporation. And Enthusiastically Cheered by the Vast Crowds of Her Loving People.

London, March 9.—When the Queen visited the city yesterday afternoon she was welcomed by the lord mayor and corporation in their robes of state. The lord mayor presented Her Majesty with the city sword of state. The route was thronged with people, and the greatest of enthusiasm prevailed everywhere.

A quaint ceremony occurred when the Queen's carriage stopped at the Temple steps. When the lord mayor, Mr. J. Newson, solemnly handed Her Majesty the sword of state, with a smile, the Queen touched it, and returned it to the chief executive, saying: "Thank you for all that my city has done." To which the mayor replied: "Your Gracious Majesty's words will be forever treasured in my heart." Then the Life Guards trotted on, the purple and ermine and gorgeous uniforms, the marshal and aides, and with the gold-laced lunkies and lumbering state coaches led behind, and the Queen drove quickly along the embankment, which was

BLACK WITH CHEERING PEOPLE. Accompanying Her Majesty were the Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein and Princess Henry of Battenberg. By five o'clock the Queen, going by way of Holborn and Oxford street, had returned to Buckingham Palace. The drive had been so hastily planned that no organ, or attempt at decoration had been carried out, but considering the short space of time it was astonishing to see the number of flags which appeared along the route followed by Her Majesty.

Many American flags were displayed by American concerns and Americans on the street.

RECENT VICTORIES CELEBRATED. Queen Victoria and the people in the greatest city in her empire yesterday celebrated the victories which they believe have transformed the campaign in South Africa from one of reverses to one of victory. This explains the unbounded, the unparalleled enthusiasm with which hundreds of thousands hailed their sovereign. In many ways these demonstrations outdid the diamond jubilee, although there were no glittering pageants, no triumphal arches, no procession of princes, but only a dozen Life Guards.

Boer Reports

MISLEADING. London, March 9.—Mr. Hollowell, the Daily News' correspondent at Mafeking, who passed two months in prison in Pretoria, escaped last week and was recaptured 60 miles from Pretoria, sends a dispatch to his paper, dated Pretoria jail, March 3, via Lorenzo Marquez, describing the misleading news given the Boers by their officers regarding the course of the war. He adds that great dissatisfaction exists among the Boers, as their supplies of food, especially meat, coffee and sugar, are very irregular, and many threaten to return to their farms.

Pretoria, March 6, via Lorenzo Marquez, March 8.—It is officially stated here that on Thursday last there was heavy fighting at Dordrecht, where the British were repulsed with great loss, and that the federals captured three cannon.

[A dispatch, previously published, dated Dordrecht, March 5, said: "Gen. Erabant has scored a complete victory. The Boers are in full retreat with their guns and wagons, and are being pursued."]

Boer Camp, Biggarsberg, Monday, March 5.—At a general council of war, held today, Louis Botha was appointed lieutenant-general for Natal, and Lukas Meyer Schalkburger, David Joubert, Daniel Erasmus and J. Fourie were appointed major-generals. The selections have given lively satisfaction to the burghers.

A special dispatch from Bloemfontein says: President Kruger, addressing a crowd of people, said: "Although God is testing our people, my personal opinion is that the limit of the test is nearly reached.
