REAL CROCODILE

Lady Flirted With Saurian---Lost Her Senses and Her Handkerchief.

New York, Sept. 4.-Two hundred boys from the Catholic Protectorate formed in line yesterday and marched over to the New York Zoological Park and went all through the open-air show. They got away a little too early to see an incident which caused commotion in the reptile house. A woman, after looking at the big crocodile, which has a reputation as a fighter, said:

"Why, he looks just like a real crocodile." Then she flirted her handkerchief at the crocodile's nose, and the reptile, which had lain motionless until then, suddenly snapped its big jaws at her, catching the handkerchief. Then it did some thrashing with its tail. Keeper George Stackdale quieted it, and then led away the woman, who had become faint. She didn't go back for her handkerchief.

BARBARIY OF THE BOERS!

Two Unarmed British Scouts Captured and Shot in Cold Blood---A Nursemaid Butchered.

London, Sept. 3.-The colonial office published tonight a dispatch from the governor of Cape Colony, Sir Walter Hely-Hutchinson, received Sept. 1, announcing that the Boers on Aug. 28 captured two unarmed British scouts near Haarekloof and shot them in cold blood.

THE CAPTURE OF THE PIETERSBURG TRAIN.

A detailed account of the capture of a Pietersburg train, 25 miles north of Pretoria, says: The Boers cunningly selected a deep cutting in the railway, and blew it up with the railway mechanism, which was placed beneath a rail. The man who made the connection did so prematurely, and caused the explosion as a train of trucks was passing over the point. These trucks had been placed in front of the engine for the purpose of saving the train proper from just such an explosion. The Boers, who had been waiting for the train, then rushed to the trucks. As soon as the explosion occurred the Boers opened fire from the trucks, killing two of the Boers, killing ten and wounding sixteen men. Lieut.-Col. Vandelaar gallantly stepped on a platform to direct his men and was shot point-blank and killed.

SHOT DOWN A GIRL.

A Dutch nursemaid was shot deliberately by a young Boer, who knew her. The Boer took all the passengers' valuables and money and even their boots, and then burned the train. The attack was made on a section of the line south of Pietersburg, which had been before interfered with. The line is not fully protected by block posts, the system being applied first to the places which were considered to be most in need of it. The system has been applied to about 2,000 miles of railway, block houses being erected at every fifteen hundred yards. In consequence of the vast extent of the work, material is becoming scarce. The building of block houses on the line where the attack was made, is being actively carried on.

LOOTING GOES ON.

A well-mounted force of Boers has looted the Swellendam district, 140 miles from Cape Town. Scheepers's Boer command passed close to Montague yesterday, and had the slightest of the local command. They had spare horses and were apparently well equipped. A column of troops was gone in pursuit.

PEACE CONFERENCE IN RE STEEL STRIKE.

Between Samuel Gompers, President Schwab, John Mitchell and Other Leaders on Both Sides.

New York, Sept. 4.-A conference, at which conditions of peace in the great steel strike are being discussed is in progress at the office of the United States Steel Corporation. The participants in the discussion include President Schwab, of the United States Steel Corporation, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers' Association, Prof. Jenks, of the Industrial Commission, Secretary Easley, of the Civic Federation, and Harry White, secretary of the Garment Workers' Association.

The conference was arranged this morning, and was asked for by Samuel Gompers and John Mitchell, who are believed to be acting in behalf of President Theodore J. Shaffer and the Amalgamated Association. They reached here early this morning and were joined by Messrs. Jenks, Easley and White. The entire party came down town at 10 o'clock, and at 12:15 o'clock entered the Empire Building and went to the offices of the United States Steel Corporation. They were received by Mr. Schwab and shown to the consulting room.

Shortly after their arrival Verrill Preston and some of the officials of the subsidiary companies entered Mr. Schwab's office and joined the conference. None of the participants in the conference could be seen and the basis of the discussion could not be learned. Pittsburgh, Sept. 4.-The strike at the Pennsylvania tube plant in this city is broken practically. This morning 150 of the strikers went to work in the plant, and Superintendent James McMutts says the plant will be running full in a few days. The rest of the strikers, about 600, will meet this afternoon to decide whether they shall return.

RECEPTION TO PREMIER G. W. ROSS

Will Take the Form of an Excursion to Port Dalhousie.

Toronto, Sept. 4.-An enthusiastic meeting of Liberals was held at the Ross House last evening, when definite plans were made for a demonstration of welcome to be given in honor of Hon. George W. Ross, premier of Ontario, and Mrs. Ross, on their return from England about Sept. 20. Mr. H. M. Mowat, K. C., president of the Toronto Reform Association, was in the chair. Mr. Mowat suggested at the outset that the matter should be taken over to the Liberal clubs of the city, and given to the Liberal clubs of the city. This suggestion was adopted, and it was decided to leave the arrangement of details in the hands of the presidents of the various Young Liberal clubs of the city.

It was decided that the welcome should take the form of an excursion to Port Dalhousie by steamer at popular prices, by which Liberals and their friends may meet their esteemed leader, and while on the way home tender him a reception and listen to one or two speeches. The arrangements have not been completed, but it is intended to have a steamer capable of carrying about 800 people.

MANITOU LINE STEAMER BURNED.

All the Passengers and Crew Escaped Safely, Though Some Were Slightly Burned.

Providence Bay, Ont., Sept. 4.-The Manitou Line mail steamer John Long, bound out from the mainland with many passengers and the mails for the islands in Georgian Bay, was burned yesterday in Meldrum Bay.

All the passengers and crew escaped, although some of them were slightly burned before they reached a place of safety.

The burned boat was owned by Capt. Cleland. She was insured for \$5,000.

News in a Nutshell.

Forty cars of new wheat were shipped east from Winnipeg on the Canadian Pacific Sunday.

The body of a man, believed to be Edward Delaney, of Bradford, was found floating in Midland Bay.

C. P. R. traffic earnings for the week ended Aug. 31, \$399,000; for the same week last year, \$346,000; increase, \$53,000.

Edward Doherty, a well-known animal trainer and vaudeville entertainer, died on Tuesday in Kansas City, Mo.

The government of South Australia is anxious to secure a Canadian to fill the position of government professor of agriculture.

Miss Elizabeth Mackenzie, a daughter of Wm. Lyon Mackenzie, died in Chicago on Sunday, and will be buried in Toronto today.

The customs collection for August at the port of Windsor amounted to \$35,011.69, an increase of \$10,917.93 over the same period last year.

An Ottawa dispatch says: A prohibitory fish of great size has been found imbedded in the clay near Papineauville. The fish had a head two feet long.

The will of Louis Thurston Hoyt, of New York, who died some weeks ago at Mannheim, Germany, bequeaths an estate estimated to be worth between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000.

The bulk of the estate is left in trust for his widow.

A monument is to be erected in Ottawa city hall square to the memory of Ottawa soldiers who fell in South Africa. The monument is to be a gift from the children of Ottawa district.

The twentieth annual convention of the Stationary Engineers' Association opened Tuesday at Rochester, N. Y., with over 1,000 delegates and alternates present.

The difficulty between the Ursuline nuns and the city of Quebec with reference to the transfer of the Plains of Abraham has been settled, and the deeds will be signed shortly.
