Literary Notes.

THE SMART SET.

"Kersale," a strong and distinctive novelette, by Justus Miles Forman, is a marked feature of the April Smart Set. Its theme is a quiet old Boston legend, with which a romantic love tale is interwoven. Among several clever short stories, the most conspicuous are: "Two Women Grinding at a Mill," by Emory Pottle; "Little Lone Loon," by G. B. Burkin; "A New York Courtship," by Gertrude Lynch; "When a Merry Maiden Marries," by Alfred Oliver; "The Chime," by Kate Masterson; "At Pightful Hazard," by Cecil Charles; and "A Man of Some Importance," by Prince Vladimir Vanitsky. Then there is an essay by Douglas Story, "God's Own Country," and poems by Madison Cawein, Julia C. R. Dor, Clinton Schuch, Felix Carmel, Charles Buxton, John Vance Cheney, Minna Irving, Zola Gale, Charlotte Becker, William Hamilton Hayne, Victor Plarr, Theodosia Garrison, Ella Wheeler Wilcox and Elsa Barker. Wit and humor hold a prominent place, and altogether the April number of Smart Set is decidedly attractive.

THE COSMOPOLITAN.

The Cosmopolitan Magazine caters to many tastes, and is remarkable for the variety of its fiction. It contains include seventeen stories and articles, and over 100 pictures. Chief place is given to a striking article on "The Americanization of the Canadian Northwest," by William E. Stewart. A personal sketch of the Western Bjornson, the prophet-poet of Norway, is entertainingly written and well illustrated. "To Love or To Be Loved," is a philosophical essay, by Lavina Hart. Dr. George F. Shears writes on "Medicine," "Famous Cures and Humbugs of Europe," by the late Julian Ralph. "Romances of the World's Great Mines" (Calumet and Hecla), by S. E. Moffet. There are also two sketches—one on the great financier, Jacob H. Schiff, and the other on the sugar king, H. O. Havemeyer. Several other well-known writers contribute to this number of the Cosmopolitan.

CANADIAN MAGAZINE.

The Easter number of the Canadian Magazine, with its colored cover and tinted pages, shows that Canadian printers and lithographers are keeping abreast of the times. The table of contents also presents a choice and appetizing variety for the delectation of the reader. The article on "The Burning of the Parliament Buildings" recalls a most exciting period in our history, and explains why Montreal ceased to be the capital of Canada. "From Quebec to James Bay," by E. T. D. Chambers, with the illustrations, shows the possibilities of great industrial and agricultural development in a region until recently thought uninhabitable. Norman Patterson's article on "Our Transcontinental Railways" gives a bird's-eye view of the transportation problem, which is well worth a close study. "Colonial Naval Reserves," by P. T. McGrath, is most timely in view of Canada's decision to establish such a force. In addition, there is a long poem by W. Wilfred Campbell, and several stories, besides the serials and departments.

AT JAPAN'S FAIRThe Dominion's Participation
Appraised by Press.

ANTI-JAPANESE LEGISLATION

Complimentary References to Sir
Wilfrid Laurier and Hon.
Sydney Fisher.

Ottawa, April 6.—The mails from Japan bring clippings from prominent Japanese papers in regard to the Osaka Exhibition and the part which Canada is taking in connection therewith. The "Jiki Shimpou" (Times) of Tokio publishes a cut of Hon. Sydney Fisher, commissioner extraordinary to Japan, and in an editorial says: "Hon. Sydney Fisher, who has lately arrived in connection with the Osaka Exhibition, which is now in progress of construction in Tokio. There is no doubt a number of distinguished statesmen and business men may be coming to Japan later on, and it is probable that Mr. Fisher should be heartily welcomed by the nation as a first distinguished visitor to our empire. As is well-known by our public, Canada is the largest English colony, and one of our nearest neighbors across the Pacific. Canada has of late made such gigantic strides in her industrial and commercial progress that there is every prospect of increasing the trade between Japan and Canada—exchanging their agricultural and fishery products with our tea, silk and sundries. The Jiki Shimpou points out that while all foreign countries are taking a great interest in the Osaka Exhibition, the Canadian Government have built a separate building, which they have filled with useful products, and no other nation has anything to equal Canada's display. The Minister of Agriculture's mission is an evidence of how true and sincere is Canada's desire to cultivate both friendly and commercial relations with Japan, and the editorial declares: 'In this connection, we could never for a moment hesitate to reciprocate such good feelings towards our nearest eastern neighbor.'

ANT-JAPANESE LEGISLATION. The paper goes on to point out that while a certain provincial parliament has more than once enacted anti-Japanese laws, the Dominion Government have never hesitated to disown them, and the Japanese colony have been free to enjoy their rights and privileges under treaty stipulation between Great Britain and Japan. The Jiki Shimpou gathers that this will continue to be the policy of the Canadian Government under "that eminent statesman," Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and concludes by saying: "Our people, both at home and in Canada, should feel grateful and always remember what we owe to the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It is our duty to unite in welcoming one of his able ministers and endeavor to do our best in entertaining him and tendering him every facility and privilege to carry out his important mission as a representative of the great Dominion. The result will be when he goes home for him to explain our true character to his own people in Canada, who have never discovered our merits of being their friends, and through his efforts the people of both nations will eventually be better known, and both friendly and commercial relations will become much closer, to the best advantage of the nations concerned."

THE CANADIAN BUILDING. The Jiki Shimpou of Tokio and The Asahi Shimbun of Osaka both have articles describing the Canadian building and its contents. The latter paper says: "As to the experience and practical knowledge of their work, no Japanese can be in any way equal to these enterprising Canadians."

WHEATLEY HAS SMALLPOX

Three Families Quarantined With the Disease.

Wheatley, April 6.—There has been a mild outbreak of smallpox in this village. Dr. J. C. Munro, on being called to a well-developed case of smallpox, watched it until there was no doubt of the diagnosis, and immediately reported it to the health officer of Mersea Township, and telegraphed Dr. Hodgson, the provincial health officer, who agreed and commended him for his thorough action in the cases. He then quarantined the three families afflicted with the disease.

GREAT SLAUGHTER
IN MACEDONIAAnother Sanguinary Contest
in Which Many Perish.

INSURGENT BANDS WIPED OUT

The Bashi-Bazouks Indulge in the
Usual Atrocities—Turks on
the Move.

London, April 4.—The Sofia correspondent of the Times sends an account by an eyewitness of the recent attack on the village of Carbitzal. A Turkish cavalry squadron entering the village at dawn, discovered a band of 24 insurgents under two Bulgarian officers. The squadron was then considerably reinforced by Turkish regulars and Bashi-Bazouks, and the Macedonian band occupied a strongly built house and refused to surrender. The women and children in the house were urged to withdraw, but fearing Turkish molestation, remained. The Turkish commander, placing some Bulgarian peasants before his troops, again summoned the insurgents to surrender. The peasants to stand aside, fired two volleys into the ranks of the Turks, many of whom were killed. The infuriated survivors immediately slaughtered the Bulgarian peasants.

An obstinate conflict between the troops and insurgents ensued and lasted throughout the day. At will the beleaguered house was on fire and eighteen of its occupants reached another house. The Turks then bombarded the village with four guns, six houses soon being in flames. The insurgents fought in the open until they were almost annihilated, and their ammunition was exhausted, when three of them committed suicide, and their leader, having killed five others at their request, also committed suicide.

Such an incident, says the Times, is a constant reminder of the Montenegrin and Macedonian warfare. After the fighting the Bashi-Bazouks plundered the village and the usual barbarities followed. The Turkish version of the affair states that the members of the revolutionary band were all killed with the exception of one man, who was taken prisoner, but an informant of the Times correspondents was unable to see the prisoner. The Turkish account of the fight omits any mention of the bombardment.

TURKEY TO SEND TROOPS.

London, April 6.—There has been little further development in the Balkan crisis since Saturday. The rumor of the death of M. Stoberlina, the Russian consul at Mitrovitz, who was shot by an Albanian sentry, proves to have been premature, but the consul's condition is serious. It is reported that the Albanian soldier who shot him has been sentenced to fifteen years' hard labor.

According to a dispatch from Constantinople, the Austrian, Russian and British ambassadors have had audiences of the Sultan, on whom they expressed the necessity of suppressing the Albanian rebellion. The Sultan informed them that in the event of the failure of the pacificatory mission that he had dispatched to Albania he would take the army corps readiness to occupy Mitrovitz should such a measure become necessary. The correspondent further affirms that a dangerous agitation exists among the Mahomedan population of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which is secretly arming itself, in spite of all official precautions, with the intention, it is feared, of emigrating to old Serbia to swell the ranks of the insurgent Albanians.

A telegram from Belgrade reports that rioting has taken place there as a result of the demonstration against an objectionable police regulation and many persons were wounded in the course of the disorders.

GERMANY TAKES A HAND

Will Aid Austria in Solving Balkan Trouble.

Berlin, April 6.—Germany has finally decided to intervene in the Macedonian crisis. Dr. Krich Pasha, the Turkish ambassador, had a long conference with the Minister of Foreign Affairs. The German Government has yielded to Austria's request to send a mission to use its influence with the Porte in order to secure more effective measures against the Albanian and Macedonian revolutionary elements. Germany has hitherto refrained from common action with Austria and Russia, but she now intends to make representations through the Turkish ambassador, Dr. Krich Pasha, to the Sultan that the European powers all support the Austro-Russian reform plans.

CHAMBERLAIN'S DENIAL

He Says Home Rule Will Not Be the
Leading Plank.

London, April 6.—Colonial Secretary Chamberlain was asked if there was any truth in the statements made by the Dublin correspondent of the Daily Chronicle, yesterday, to the effect that the Government intends to dissolve Parliament at the end of the present session, that the leading plank of the Conservative platform would be an enormous extension of local government in Ireland; that the Irish police would be placed under the control of a legislative council; that Mr. Chamberlain would support these proposals; that the Government, and that neither Gerald Balfour, president of the board of trade, nor War Secretary Brodrick will be included in the next cabinet. Mr. Chamberlain replied: "The statements are absolutely untrue, both as they regard myself and as they regard the Government generally."

BLEW UP AT SEA

Steamship Bambara Believed to Have
Been Dynamited.

London, April 6.—It is believed the steamer Bambara, on her first trip from Marseilles to Dakar, French West Africa, with a cargo of about 55,000 pounds of gunpowder, and two cases of dynamite, was blown up at sea, and foundered. Lloyd's says there is reason to fear that this has occurred, although no confirmation is at hand. The Bambara has not been reported from Gibraltar, although she should have been sighted there March 31. The captain of the French schooner Assomption, of Marseilles, reports that on March 28, when 60 miles off Ile de Palmiera, he saw a brilliant flash which was followed by a loud explosion. The captain of the Nina makes a similar report. The crew of the Bambara numbered 35 men and she carried 56 passengers.

DEAL IN BREWERIES

Buffalo Syndicate May Purchase
Hamilton Plants.

Hamilton, April 6.—H. E. Hand, of Buffalo, representing a syndicate of Buffalo capitalists, has secured options on the three Hamilton breweries, viz., the Kuntz brewery, the Gompf brewery, and Grant's Spring brewery, and it is understood the amount offered for the three concerns totals between \$500,000 and \$600,000. The local breweries now sell their product at \$1.50 per barrel, whereas the price in other cities is \$1.75 a barrel. The idea of the syndicate is to form a company with a capital of \$1,000,000, and by raising the price \$1.50 a barrel there will be good money in the speculation, as the local brewers are making money at the present price.
