Dr. Barrow's Startling Experiments With Formaline.

New York, Jan. 17.—At the last meeting of the New York Obstetrical Society, Dr. Charles C. Burrows submited a report of an experiment with formaline, a drug known as the strongest of antiseptics, which he had made in Bellevue Hospital on a patient, who, after giving birth to a child, had a temperature of 108 degrees and a pulse

When the patient was admitted she was suffering from sepsis, or blood poisoning. A blood culture was taken and it was found to be full or septicaemia, known to the medical profes-

sion as streptococci. The belief was that the patient was dying and the most radical measures were used. Five hundred cubic centimeters of formaline were injected into the left arm. The effect seemed to be lmost instantaneous. A second injection was given her, and her pulse and temperature fell to normal. The
