STOCK MARKETS.

H. C. Becker, broker, Bank of Commerce building, received the following by private wire from Bartlett, Frazier & Carling today:

New York, Nov. 18.—Noon.—There has been no feature of the stock market today. The prices have been generally well maintained and sentiment relatively good. It is probable that a drive against price will be attempted before the close of the market today, but it seems to be sufficient ginger in the list to resist any such attempt. There were some weakness in Pennsylvania in the early trading, but it got over it bravely. The drive against Steel, preferred, was a little more effective, and that stock lacked barometer. Traders have been well maintained, and even if the instruction of the strength of these securities is a semi-political, semi-manipulative affair, it is having a good effect generally. Despite extremes of pessimism, which are being voiced daily, there is an undercurrent of reassurance which firms it up from time to time. The features of the market yesterday, Alton and T. D. I., were consistently strong today, although lacking in spectacular features. The industrial stocks well and the grangers betray latent possibilities. Pacific Mail has been strong on improved chances for digging the Panama Canal. Reading has been well. Sales in the market were:

LOCAL MARKET.

London, Wednesday, Nov. 18.

The offerings on the market here today consisted mostly of hay, of which there were 21 loads; sales were made at \$5.50, and the market was steady; \$7 to \$8 was paid for poor and medium quality. A few loads of straw sold at \$5 per ton.

About a dozen loads of oats sold at \$5 to \$5.50 per ton.

Several loads of wheat were sold at \$1.30 per bushel.

A number of cattle were weighed, for which 16 cents was paid.

WEEKLY REVIEW.

The markets here during the past six days have been fairly large. The attendance of last Saturday was exceptionally large, being the biggest since the opening of the market last spring. The deliveries in all lines were fairly large, and the market was generally brisk.

Grain—Oats are in good demand, at \$5 to \$5.50 per cent, more selling at \$5.50 to \$6 per bushel. Wheat—Sells at \$1.30 per bushel, at \$1 and at \$1.10.

Hay and Straw—The deliveries of hay were not as large as the previous week, and the market is steady. The demand is good for choice hay, at \$5 to \$6 per ton; inferior loads are dull at \$4 to \$5 per ton. Straw is scarce at present, from \$5 to \$5.50 per ton being paid.

Butter and Eggs—Prices of butter unchanged; there is more coming forward at present, and the demand is not as brisk as at the close of the previous week. Eggs—The market is steady, and prices are higher, at 22 to 23 cents per dozen wholesale, and 25 cents per dozen retail.

Fruits—There is a big supply of apples being offered at present; sales were made at \$1.50 per bushel for hand-picked, and 10 to 12 cents per bushel for dressed and 8 to 10 cents per bushel for undressed. Potatoes—The market is steady, and prices are higher, at 22 to 23 cents per bushel, and 25 cents per bushel for hand-picked, and 10 to 12 cents per bushel for dressed and 8 to 10 cents per bushel for undressed.
