## POPULISM REDIVIVUS.

The Populists are to be again in evidence in the coming presidential election campaign. They have already held a convention at St. Louis. and in spite of the efforts of Mr. Bryan's friends to secure a postponement, have nominated candidates for president and vice-president. For the former office, Mr. Tom Watson, who headed their ticket in 1904, has been again placed in nomination, but has not yet accepted. A feature of the convention was the withdrawal of the delegations from Nebraska and Minesota, the former declaring that Nebraska Populists to a man support Mr. Bryan in the event of his nomination by the Democrats at Denver. The chief planks of the platform are those which advocate "greenbackism," Government ownership of railroads, the initiative and referendum, public work for unemployed, and legislation depriving the federal courts of the power of annulling acts of Congress approved by the executive.


