Lack of Ice in Quantity and Quality Accounts for Scotland's Defeat by Canadians—Pay Little Attention to Turn—Old Country-men Play Straight Shots—Secretary's Report of Trip.

Toronto, March 9.—The return of the curling team from Scotland yesterday confirms the conviction that lack of steady ice, and consequently want of practice, in Scotland was the cause of the superiority of the tourists. While there is a slight improvement in Glasgow, the other centres have to depend upon outdoor ice, and it lacks in quality and in quantity.

Had Great Time.

Miss Finlay's Points.

The quality of the outdoor ice, available everywhere but in Glasgow, made the majority of the Scottish players use straight and running shots, and so no amount of paying little or no attention to turns or borrows. The ice was not pebbled, even at Glasgow, but sprinkled only. The result was that the drawing game, so great a feature in this country, and so frequent of the finer points of the game, was almost entirely ignored by the home players.

Results Not So Bad.

The results were not so bad, either, though the Canadians did win all but three of their matches, and one of them was the first one played. Of course, the splendid draw game of the tourists was handicapped by the lack of pebbled ice, but it won, and pretty handsily.

First Lot Back.

The first contingent of the Ontario touring curlers returned yesterday. Two Toronto men were on hand in Simpson Rennie and Rennie McDonald.

Report of Secretary.

H. S. Wills, of Montreal, honorary secretary of the tour, gave the following report of the visit: "Our team, consisting of 11 members from the Manitoba branch, 10 from Ontario, 10 from Quebec, and 6 from Nova Scotia, in all 37 men, left Halifax Jan. 1, 1909, and sailed that day by the R. M. S. Empress of Ireland, landing at Liverpool Jan. 15, and reaching Edinburgh the same day. The team remained in Scotland until Feb. 24, and played during the interval a

total of 26 matches, the results of which are summarized as follows: "Matches won, 23; shots up, 947. Matches lost, 3; shots down, 10. Majority of shots scored by Canadians, 821.

"Of the above matches those against Inverness, Province, Northeastern Province, and at Balmoral were played on natural ice in the open. The rest of the matches were all played on artificial ice at the Crossmyle Rink, Glasgow.

Results Won All.

"The record of the results obtained as skis by the individual members of the team makes it difficult to single out any one, but I feel it my duty, in the case of Simpson Rennie, of Toronto, to mention that he has obtained the distinction of skipping nine matches without a loss, a showing which is all the more to his credit in that he has been the oldest member of the team, having celebrated his 50th birthday on the 2nd inst. It may be noted that the only member of the team who played in every match was William Rennie, of Ottawa. He skipped 21 of the games, winning 15, drawing 3 and losing 3.

Exhibit Trophy.

"As a result of the team's success in each of the three test matches against Scotland (six rinks a side), a handsome cup, donated by Lord Strathcona, is now brought back by us to Canada, there to remain in our keeping until Dec. 1 next, when it will have to be returned to the custody of the Royal Club. It has been arranged that in the interval the cup will be transferred for exhibition to the curling clubs of the four Canadian branches of the Royal Club. It cost 100 guineas, and will be shown at Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg.

Cup Described.

The Strathcona cup is a most beautiful one, of silver, on an ebony base. It is made in the shape of a punch bowl, with a handle on either side. Around the top is the inscription: "Presented by Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal to the Caledonian Curling Club." At the base is the inscription: "To commemorate his presidency of the club and of the first visit of the Canadian Curling Club to Scotland, January, 1909." Opposite this plate is another inscription, which reads: "Canadian Curling Club, Glasgow, February, 1909."

The Internationals.

Skip McDonald, of Winnipeg, had two Canadians, being taken to the championship in Switzerland. Only three of the Canadian tourists took in the bonspiel in the Alps.

LIPMANS SET NEW
TEAM RECORD

Roll 2,962 in Pittsburgh Tourney Establishing World's Record for Tournament Work.

Duquesne Gardens, Pittsburgh, March 8.—One record for national events went to the board in the play in the five-men event Saturday in the ninth annual tournament of the American Bowling Congress now running at the Duquesne Gardens in this city. The Lipmans, of Chicago, were the ones to distinguish themselves, rolling three wonderfully steady games of a total of 2,962, thirty-five pins more than the world's record of 2,927, established by the Edwards, of Columbus, at Cincinnati last season. Their totals were 985, 979 and 998.

Frank Bartach was the star of the series, although every man rolled magnificent games for an average of 157, having scores of 223, 232 and 256, the mark being far the best of the tournament.
