THOMPSON-SETON'S TRIP
Author Traveled Over 2,000 Miles by
Canoe in Canadian Wilds.

Edmonton, Nov. 10. — "We found
plenty of material for our pens," said
Ernest Thompson Seton, the animal
story writer, describing the trip he
took with Edward A. Peabody, of the
United States Department of Agricul-
ture, into the far north, "we will no
doubt be able to write something in-
teresting about the country we vis-
ited."

Mr. Seton stated that they had tra-
veled over 2,000 miles by canoe, going
from Athabasca Landing to Smith's
Landing, thence to Great Slave Lake,
and to Fort Resolution on the return.
They covered the entire trip in six
months, something which Mr. Seton
believes has never been done before.
When asked regarding the great
stretch of country known as the Bar-
rens, Mr. Seton stated that the coun-
try abounded in game of many kinds,
chiefly caribou and musk ox. Al-
though entirely barren of trees and of
human habitation, it was covered with
vegetation, but the season was too
short for wheat-growing.

The country about Great Slave Lake
and northwest was most beautiful, said
the author, and grew an abundance of
small fruits and flowers of every
description. There were scarcely any
white people in the region, however,
the inhabitants being mostly Indians
and half-breeds.

The author sees no reason why the
southern parts of the country they
visited should not develop rapidly into
settlements. The climate is very de-
sirable, and the land is good. Espe-
cially is this so of the Lower Peace
River district, in which they spent
some weeks.

WAS DROOD DRUCE?

Did Author Dickens Know the Late
Duke of Portland.

London, Nov. 10. — Charles Dickens'
alleged connection with the Druce case
is one of the most amazing features of
that amazing story. Members of the
Dickens family here have issued a dis-
claimer to the effect that it is in their
knowledge that Charles Dickens never
knew the Duke of Portland, but the
diary which has been stolen from Miss
Robinson, a Virginia woman, who was
the secretary of Druce for many years,
contains numerous references to
Dickens. It was Dickens, she said, who
introduced her to Druce.

A long passage in the diary is de-
voted to the story he is alleged to have
told of the duke's identity with
Druce. A curious coincidence, unnoted
here, in Dickens' last book, "The
Mystery of Edwin Drood," is that it
is a story of a man with a dual exist-
ence. Did Druce suggest Drood?

The present Duke of Sutherland is
said to be furious because his friends
will insist upon sympathizing with
him on the prospect of his losing his
title. He declares that the whole
Druce claim is an imposture which
may end in jail.

DR. MOULTON ON THE FAIRY QUEEN

A Brilliant Analysis of Spenser's
Masterpiece—The Bible as
Literature.

The pulpit of the First Methodist
Church was occupied on Sunday by
Dr. Moulton, of the University of Chi-
cago. Large congregations were pres-
ent at both services, and the lectures
were much appreciated.
The morning subject was on St.
Matthew. He noted the difference be-
tween the gospels, a difference noted
by every reader. Varied reasons had
been given for that difference. He
would give his opinion not as a theo-
logian, but as a student of literature.
The gospel of St. Matthew differed
from the other gospels in that it was
not a history, but was wisdom litera-
ture after the style of Job, Ecclesi-
astes, the Proverbs, and the Epistles
of St. James. It was a singularly com-
plete philosophy. Philosophy was
meditation on things in general, and
the philosophy of the Bible dealt with
conduct and always had reference to
that. An ordinary philosopher might
be a good philosopher but a bad man.
That was not true of the philosophy
of the Bible.

The Number Seven.
The number seven stood for com-
pletion and orderly arrangement
among the Hebrews, and nowhere in
the Bible is it more manifest than in
the Gospel of St. Matthew. The
seven-fold construction was very evi-
dent throughout the whole gospel. The
parables were seven. The Sermon on
the Mount was the seven-fold expo-
sition of the law of the wheat and the
chaff, and the building up of the
church idea. This is carried out
through twelve sections, and at the
last, when the ascension of Christ
takes place, the writer does not men-
tion it. He is dealing with the de-
velopment of the kingdom on earth.

The Bible as Literature.
The evening subject was "The Liter-
ary Study of the Bible." The Bible was
a library of literature, containing poet-
ry, both epic and lyric, dramas, his-
tory, wisdom, literature, and every
form of literature known to men. It
developed during the history of the
Hebrew race. It should be studied as
such. Sometimes quotations are made
and on such quotations systems of
theologies are formed and argument
answered. Some even seek by such
quotations to overthrow faith in the
Bible. Such reckless use of quota-
tions was wrong. The books should
be studied as a whole. A gem of
poetry, often it was dangerous. As an
example, he quoted many extracts
from the Bible, proverbs, and showed
that they were not true absolutely
any more than many present day
proverbs.

As to the infallibility of the Bible,
Dr. Moulton pointed out that it was
a human book, written by men, and as
such liable to error.

Spenser's Fairy Queen.

Dr. Moulton took Spenser's great
masterpiece, "The Fairy Queen," for the
subject of both his lectures Saturday. In
the afternoon he spoke on "Temper-
ance," to which over 7,000 lines of the
poem are devoted. Dr. Moulton has
made a special study of the poem, and
the result of his analysis was appar-
ent to his audience, which he pre-
sented it to his audience in a short
address on the poets of the time
of Shakespeare, Milton and Spenser,
in which he contrasted their works, Dr.
Moulton explained that by temperance,
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a human book, written by men, and as

Important Bulletin Issued by Ontario
Department of Agriculture.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—The Ontario de-
partment of agriculture has just is-
sued a bulletin on the sheep indus-

contains the result of an exhaustive
inquiry into the industry and the rea-
sons for its decrease in Ontario. These
are given as lack of profit owing to
low prices for mutton and wool, losses
from disease and at lambing time.

It is pointed out in respect to the

one, provided the other drawbacks can
be offset. Suggestions with this in
view are given, including proposed
amendments to the sheep protection

**TURNKEY TALKS
OF BIRCHALL**

**Mr. James Forbes Gives Interest-
ing Reminiscences of His
Famous Prisoner.**

Woodstock, Nov. 10. — Mr. James
Forbes, for twenty years a turnkey of
Oxford county jail, has retired. He has
marked his removal from the turn-
key's house by relating to a reporter
some interesting reminiscences re-
garding the prisoners who have pass-
ed through his hands. He estimates that
in the twenty years he has had
charge of about 4,000 different prison-
ers.

Three years after he assumed the
duties of turnkey, Birchall said, let
Birchall case stirred two contin-
ents, and the prisoner was confined in
the jail for eight months. Turnkey
and prisoner got to be good friends,
and about once each year Mr. Forbes
received a letter from Mrs. Birchall,
who went back to England after the
execution, and writes to her at the
same intervals. In one letter which
he showed the reporter she wondered
if it was possible that "six years and
three months had passed since that
terrible trial." Birchall was hanged on
Nov. 14, 1890.

Mr. Forbes does not think that Bir-
chall ever made a confessional to any
person, though he believes that he was
guilty.

Birchall's Self-Control.

"Birchall had the most wonderful
control over himself of any man I ever
saw," said Mr. Forbes. "All the time
he was in jail he never once broke
down in the presence of his wife. The
last night he was alive his wife came
up to the jail. I went to the cell with
her and sat between them during the
interview, for we were afraid she
would assist him to commit suicide.
We sat there for a long time while
they talked, and finally I said: 'Mrs.
Birchall, you've got to go now.' 'Oh,
have I got to leave him?' she cried.
The tears just streamed down my
face. I couldn't help it. So we walk-
ed out into the corridor. I on one side
of Mrs. Birchall and the condemned
man on the other. We stood outside
for a minute, and a confessional said: 'Let
us walk up to the end of the corridor
alone.' I just looked at him, and he
said, 'Forbes, you can trust me.' I
said, 'Birchall, I will.' They walked
up to the end of the corridor and stood
there for fifteen or twenty minutes
talking together. I don't know what
they said. After a time they came back
and Mrs. Birchall left. That was the
last time they saw one another. When
Birchall heard the outer door close
after his wife he broke down com-
pletely and went all to pieces. I
thought he would never get over it,
but finally he calmed down.

was with him for part of the night,
but about 4 o'clock he came out to get
some sleep. I went in and sat with the
man for two or three hours. When the
clock struck 4 he remarked: 'Only
four hours more to live.' About three
hours before his death he wrote on the
card of a reporter which he had, his
name, 'Reg. Birchall, Nov. 14, 1890,'
and said: 'Here is my signature for
the last time.'

Other noted people have also been
at the jail during Mr. Forbes' office. He
referred to Middleton, the bigamist,
railway promoter and financier, who
was sentenced to seven years. He has
been out for some time. Bill Smith, in
his day the king of horse-thieves, also
spent several terms here, and at last,
on a vagrancy charge, came for the
last time, old and feeble, to die.

Twenty-five years ago wood tooth-
