

Ottawa, Aug. 31, 1907. Owners, masters, or persons in charge of small vessels, such as pleasare yachts, steam, gasoline, naphtha, electric or other motor launches or rowboats, under way or at anchor, in all waters frequented by other vessels, are hereby notified that they must shall be temporarily exhibited in sufcomply with the rules imposed by part XIV., chapter 113 of the "Canada shipping act, 1906, respecting the navigation of Canadian waters," for preventing collisions, especially as regards the lights to be shown.
