NIAGARA A PLAGUE SPOT

Scientist Declares That It Is Polluted With Sewage.

Rochester, Nov. 14.—Conditions at Niagara Falls were severely criticised by Professor W. T. Sedgewick of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, at last night's session of the conference of sanitary officers of the state.

Professor Sedgewick said in part: "One of the worst plague spots, if not the worst, in respect to typhoid fever in the United States is Niagara Falls, in which the death rate from this disease has risen from 10.7 to 18.5 per hundred thousand in the decade from 1897 to 1907."

"The sewage pollution of Niagara Falls is a matter of national, not merely local, concern," Mr. Sedgewick is visited annually by hundreds of thousands of persons from all parts of the country, many of whom contract typhoid fever there and die of it.

"The state of affairs at Niagara Falls is a public disgrace to the State of New York and to the United States of America."

Professor Sedgewick continued: "A careful investigation by Professor Ogden, of Cornell University, has shown beyond question that this enormous quantity of sewage is discharged into the pollution of the water supply by the sewage of the city of Buffalo."

FOOD PRICES IN GERMANY

A Steady Advance Since 1907 and Big Increases in September.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The Vossische Zeitung publishes a table of figures drawn from official reports relating to prices of food and commodities in Germany in recent years.

Remarkable differences prevailed between August and September of the present year, some few products falling, while the majority of the most important continued to rise. The price of hops, which has sunk steadily since 1907, more than doubled last month.

THRILLING ADVENTURE

A French Woman Aeronaut Dragged in the Sea.

Paris, Nov. 14.—Mlle. Marvingt, a French lady living at Nancy (France), who is well known as a swimmer, rescuer, and balloonist, reached London after an extraordinary adventurous balloon journey, during part of which the car was dragged along the surface of the sea.

She had as companion, M. Garnier, a neighbor of hers at Nancy. The pair intended to take a trip to Holland, but with the wind in their favor, they decided to continue the journey across the English Channel to England, and arrived after a stormy journey at Southampton.

The balloon, after nearly coming in contact with the lighthouse, struck some telephone wires, Mlle. Marvingt jumped out and sprained her ankle.

Released of her weight, the balloon hurtled over the sea, and the wind still blowing hard, I said to my companion, as if an inspiration had suddenly come to me, 'Let's go to England.' He was delighted with the idea, and so we kept on.

"We came to the sea, and then it began to snow and hail, and we got quite numb. For about an hour the balloon drifted in the sea, and we began to be fearful for our safety. But I could still keep our bearings."

"By throwing out ballast and everything we could spare we got the balloon to rise again, and the wind still keeping southeast, we came to land."

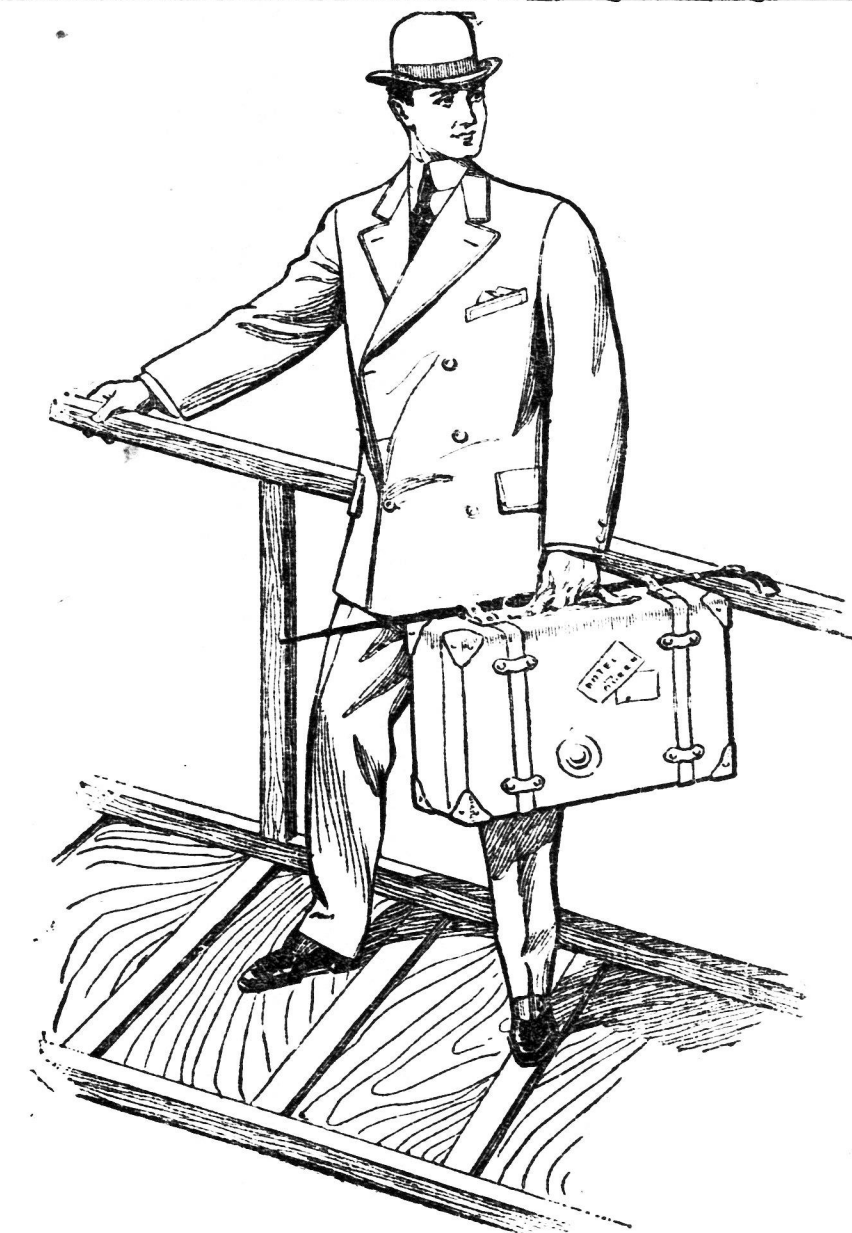
