Mr. W. H. Wortman Confirms the Estimate of Loss at Bia Fire.

Mr. W. H. Wortman, of Wortman & Ward, stated to The Advertiser this afternoon that he expected the loss in Saturday's fire would amount to between \$40,000 and \$50,000. This is partially covered by insurance, but Mr. Wortman declined to say how much was carried.
"I cannot say anything about rebuilding yet," he said. "We expect, however to be able to go right on with our work in the molding shop.
