Many Important Promotions Made in Western Staff.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—A number of important changes in the C. P. R. staff are announced. Mr. C. E. E. Usher becomes general passenger traffic manager.

## GEORGE PRIMROSE IS IN CHICAGO

London Minstrel Is Being Jollied Regarding His Age by the Newspapers.

### HE NEVER GROWS OLD

Dancing Boys Are Now Men, But Still George Dances and Makes the Money.

Richard Henry Little writes in the Chicago Tribune of George H. Primrose, the famous minstrel and former London boy: "George Primrose, who was a stowaway on a coal ship, some time ago, is back at the American Music Hall this week and many of his old-time admirers, with their children and their grandchildren, and their great grandchildren down to the fourth and fifth generation, are out in force at every performance to greet him. George is a perpetual surprise to those who advise the theatre-going public. They marvel much at seeing him each recurring year, not knowing the secret of his never seeming a day older and as skittish and lively as when they first saw him.

George does not want it circulated, but as a matter of fact he was a cabin boy on the ship that brought Ponce de Leon to America. Ponce hunted in vain for the Fountain of Youth down around Florida, but never found it. It seems that Mr. de Leon grew tired after many weeks and months spent in drinking out of every spring, creek, river, and lake he came to, and so one hot, dusty day when some of his soldiers brought word to him that they had found a new spring that looked much like the Fountain of Youth, he said peevishly: "O, pshaw, I'm tired of drinking all this bilge water you fellows find around here. Let George do it."

**This Is Sarcastic!**  
And George did, thereby not only giving George a long existence, but giving a phrase that has since grown popular among many of the interesting stories of Ponce de Leon, Sir Walter Raleigh, Queen Elizabeth, William Shakespeare, the Prince of Conde, Louis XVI, Henry of Navarre and other worthy personages of his younger day, but he prefers to forget them as far as possible and talk about recent events like the tea party in Boston harbor and the Revolutionary war. Nobody who sees George for the first time would suspect his age. But it is the little things that tell.

There was no complaint to be made about the way the boys danced. George, of course, danced as well as he could do at the court of the King of France in the sixteenth century and the two young men who were with him were grace itself.

**They "Grewed."**  
But why had George advertised Murphy and Franklin, the cute little boys who used to go with, and then brought on two such big fellows? It was on George's dressing-room door brought forth a deep bass growl. "Come in," the interviewer entered and asked George what had become of little Franklin and Murphy. A husky young man in the corner, the one who had said "come in," did another bass solo, two tones lower, and answered, "If Franklin, have you any pipe tobacco," and the other man in George's room also in deep tones said, "Don't you remember me? I am Murphy, the kid you used to bring pipes to years ago."

The question was answered. It was Murphy and Franklin, but they had grown up. George was very much chagrined over the fact that Murphy and Franklin had not remained children. But it seemed that he could not prevent it. They kept right on growing and now they are as tall as he is. They are still growing, and George said he thought that in fifteen or twenty years he would make piano movers out of them and take a couple of new boys. He has no fault to find with George, but he dislikes anything that grows older.

### MURDERERS RIDDLED WITH RIFLE BULLETS

**Posse Takes No Chances With Men Who Killed Three.**

Fort Meyers, Fla., Oct. 27.—E. J. Watson, a well-known farmer, and Leslie Cox, an ex-convict, under life sentence for murder, were riddled with bullets late last night by a posse which went to Chatham Bend Sunday to capture the slayers of Miss Ellen Smith, A. Waller and Dutche Reynolds.

Watson reported the killing of three persons at Fort Meyers last Saturday. He claimed that he had captured Cox and produced the latter's coat and gun as evidence. He was asked to produce the man, and to find him a posse accompanied Watson to Chatham Bend. Arriving there, Watson joined Cox and made a desperate resistance before both were riddled with bullets.

The triple murder was committed by Cox and a negro, now in jail here.

### MAKES AMERICANS BUILD IN CANADA

**Tariff Sends \$300,000,000 Into This Country Every Year.**

Taunton, Mass., Oct. 26.—Congressman Eugene M. Foss, Democratic nominee as governor of Massachusetts, stated here at a rally last night that the growth and prosperity of Canada during the next twenty-five years will be relatively greater than that of the United States. He wishes the States to share in this prosperity, and also declared for reciprocity and free trade with Canada which, he said, had almost unlimited resources.

Mr. Foss said that three hundred million dollars will be spent in Canada by Americans erecting factories on account of the tariff wall. No more need of free trade between Canada and the States existed than between the States of the union. The United States wants free raw material and food-stuffs.

Mr. Foss recommended a direct taxation income tax for revenue and the tariff revised downward to meet Canada's similar revision.
